

Golf course opens in south Milton

Harold Myers owned and operated the Nanticoke Golf and Country Club, near Lake Erie from 1976 to 1988. Golfers complained to him about the length of time it took to play the game they loved and the difficulty in arranging tee times.

Company tournaments and various other scheduled events clogged the tees and making it difficult for the weekend player to walk up and play. Golfers also told him that courses with trees, sandtraps and water were more challenging and interesting to play.

Today, Myers opens the course that will remove the obstacles to enjoyable golf, both tournaments and length, while preserving the challenge.

Oakville Executive Golf Course located at Lower Base Line Road and Fourth Line, plays at 3890 yards and par 61. It is studded with 50 sand traps and four large ponds, more than many regulation courses, to preserve the challenge.

With most full size courses running to 6,000 or even 7,000 yards Myers course should be much easier on time than other area courses.

"Most people associate 'executive' courses with poor quality," Myers said. "This course was designed by Canadian golf course architect Rene Muylaert."

The longest hole on the course is the par five 18th. It is a 414 yard dog-leg right. The main feature of the hole is a large pond situated so that any attempt to cut the corner of the dog-leg will be difficult. Water guards a number of landing areas and provides an instant penalty on three par three holes.

"There won't be any memberships or tournaments at the club," Myers said. He figures it might hurt him in the short run but after the course is better known people will come because they won't have to fear anything but popularity of the course.

The club house will not be finished until next year so food service will be provided out of a trailer. Green fees are \$16 on weekends and \$14 weekdays.

Gleeson will miss four to five weeks of the bantam season. Doubles by Adam Flatt, David Marshall and a three hit performance by Derek Macdonald, including a double and a triple, paced the offence.

The Lions then attended the North Bay Tournament where they worked their way to the finals before losing a heartbreaking 1-0 game to Barrie.

In the opener Milton took on league rivals Streetsville but lost by a 10-4 count. The Milton bats came to life in game two as Milton took on Sutton and defeated them 13-4. Marshall paced the attack with a dinger.

Milton won their next match against Barrie 5-1 thanks to Marshall's 11 strike out performance on the hill. He pitched five innings allowing only one hit and one run. Shayne Ferrier went in in the sixth inning and retired the side in order.

Aaron Levac had a double and Marshall pounded a homer in the big blasts for the Milton offence.

The fourth game for Milton pitted them against Barrie again, this time for the tournament title.

Excellent pitching for both teams produced a scoreless tie into the seventh. In the top of the inning Barrie managed a home run for a 1-0 lead. Milton had its chances to score in the bottom of the frame but couldn't push a run across. Macdonald pitched a complete game for Milton.

The team came back to town for a regular season game with Burlington on June 25. Ferrier, Flatt and Gleeson had singles, the latter with a pair, while Paul Nunnaro and Marshall swatted doubles in the 8-5 win.

The Milton victory pushes their regular season record to 7-4.
