Summer is the season for tornadoes

Summer is tornado season. They aren't abundant in Milton, but that doesn't mean the town is immune to them.

Most Canadians have never experienced a tornado, but they still pose a real threat to life and property.

There are, on average, 75 tornadoes a year in Canada causing deaths and injuries - not to mention millions of dollars worth of damage. If you do experience a tornado, you'll want to be prepared.

The best place to hide during a tornado is in your basement under a work bench or table. This will protect you from debris hurled into the basement. If you don't have a basement, seek shelter in a small interior room such as a bathroom or closet. Stay away from windows and outside walls.

It is extremely risky to try to drive to safety. Given the unpredictable nature of tornadoes, it is far better to get out of the car and seek shelter in a ditch, depression or culvert. Make sure you're a good distance from the car so it can't roll on you.

Avoid seeking shelter in buildings with wide free-span roofs such as gymnasiums, church sanctuaries and auditoriums. These types of structures are far more likely to collapse if hit by a tornado. If you are in one of these buildings and have no time to get out, seek shelter under a table or some other kind of sturdy cover.

While the basic structure of a highrise provides protection, the windows still present a considerable danger during tornadoes. You should take shelter in an interior hallway or room, preferably on the lower floors or in the basement. And don't use the elevators.

When severe thunderstorms threaten, turn on your radio or television and listen for local weather information. If a tornado has been reported or sighted, a ternado warning will be issued. If you seek shelter, take a battery-powered radio so you can find out what is happening.

In 1988, he executed the fifthlargest corporate takeover in history and as a result he now owns one of the biggest department stores in the United States.




