



Louis Nadalin dies from leukemia

that led to his downfall.

One of Milton's most controversial citizens has died after a 12-year struggle against leukemia. Louis Nadalin, 54, a master of the grand gesture — to some a dreamer, to others a manipulator — succumbed Monday in a Hamilton hospital.

A Campbellville woman who knew Mr. Nadalin since his teenage days praised his bracing self-confidence and sense of adventure:

His brother Henry, fiercely protective now that the legal wrangles, convictions and blaring headlines have been put to rest with the ultimate finality, steadfastly maintained that Louis Nadalin "was painted with a heavy brush" in the media.

A man of the cloth called him "as good a Christian friend as I've ever had" and recounted how Mr. Nadalin, in his twilight following, numerous prosecutions, once said, "God help me live long enough to forgive everyone who has taken a run at me."




