Milton vocalist a hit..

For the second year in a row, Milton vocalist Sonjia Vascotto took home the first-prize trophy in an Italian singing contest at Ontario Place.

"It was a shock because nobody ever wins twice in a row," she said last week.

Before an audience of about 47,000 people, Ms Vascotto and a partner successfully competed against 14 other entrants in the ninth annual Johnny Lombardi Italian-Canadian Song Festival

The contest is held in conjunction with Italian Day founded by Mr. Lombardi who is president of CHIN Radio/TV International - the sponsor of the event.

Ms Vascotto may have competed in the same festival last year, but that didn't make it any less nerve-racking for the 28year-old this year. Competitions are never easy, she said.

"There's just that much more pressure to perform to your highest potential.

This time around, she performed with Oakville singer Peter Marino, formerly of Milton. The 1990 version of the contest was held in couples.

The pair was assigned to stage two solos followed by a duet. Ms Vascotto sang Il Cielo In Uno Stanza as her solo and performed L'Immensita with Mr. Marino. As well as the trophy, the couple won \$1,500.
