

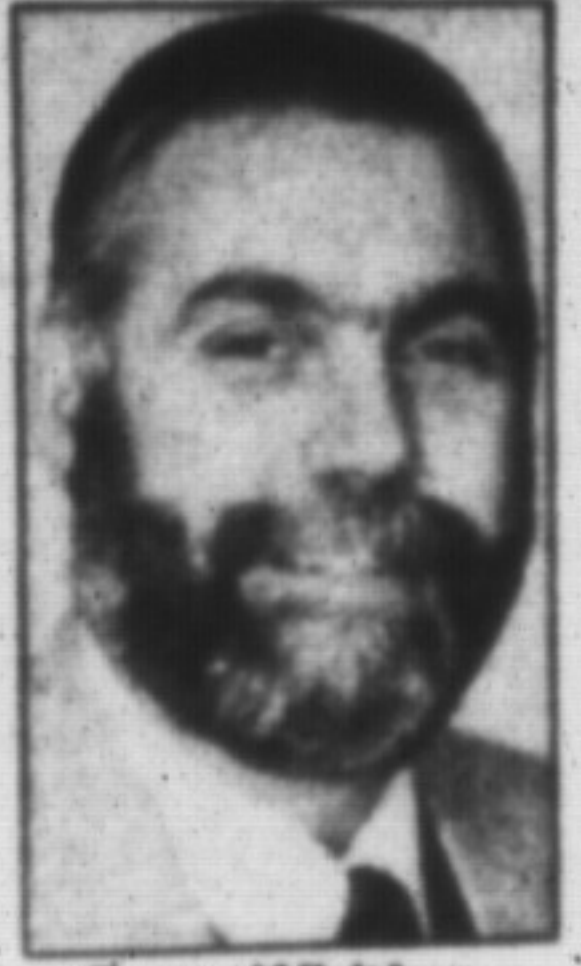

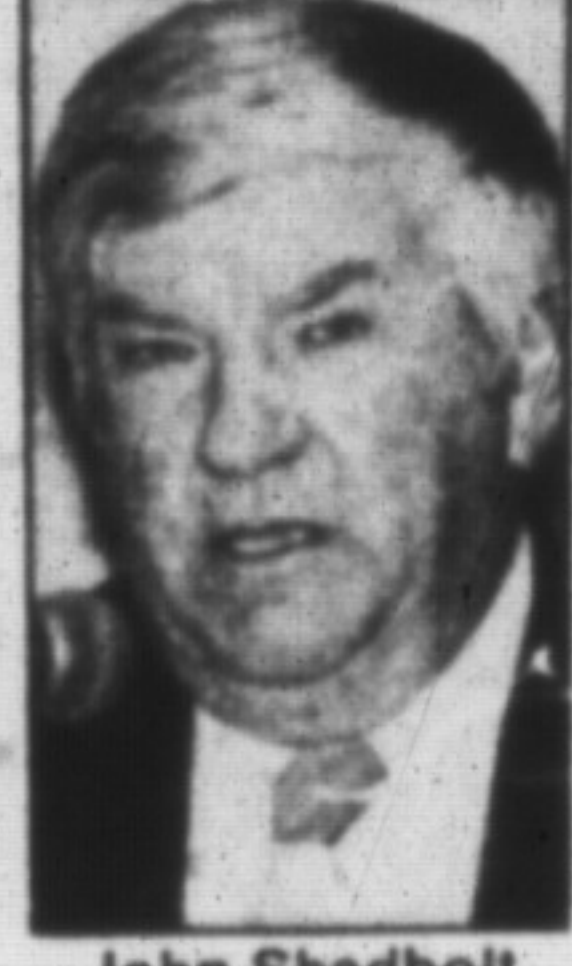

Liberals, Walt Elliot bashed by candidates

Halton North's Provincial election candidates discussed everything from health care to speed limits at an all-candidates meeting in Acton Thursday.

Sponsored by the Halton Hills Chamber of Commerce, the event attracted about 50 people to Acton High School.

"The main theme of this election has to be how to keep Ontario's economy strong," Liberal incumbent Walt Elliot told the group. "The biggest challenge is how to balance the economy with the needs of the environment."

But the MPP and his government were attacked on almost all aspects of their administration.

New Democrat Noel Duignan said that the Liberal government — and the Tories before them — had forgotten about the needs of Ontarians.

"The basic issue in this province is becoming more clear," Mr. Duignan said. "Private interests have seized their grip on the Liberal government, just as they did for 42 years of Tory rule."

Progressive Conservative Dave Whiting said voters are "fed up" with government spending habits.

"You're fed up with governments that seem to know no end to spending while we all have to tighten our belts and do without," Whiting said. "It will get worse if you send (Premier) David Peterson the representation he wants to Queen's Park."

Family Coalition candidate Giuseppe Gori said that unless the candidates and their leaders take a stand on abortion, "they are not fit to represent you."

Mr. Gori said his party "owes no favours to anyone" and that "if you want to be represented by a person with morals and integrity, you must vote for me."

Libertarian John Shadbolt termed the election, called two years before the Liberals were required to go to the polls, "grabbing at power at the peoples' expense."

He said while "it is nice to have all the safety nets people want, we have to ask if we can afford them."

Green Party candidate Patricia Kamerer did not attend the meeting.

Mr. Elliot said he's pleased with local moves that will help protect the environment.

He called the withdrawal of a proposal to expand a

Milton gravel pit and the cancellation of Dufferin Aggregates' plan to landfill in its quarry "corporate realism." And in a broad hint, Mr. Elliot said, "I hope it sets the stage for continuing corporate leadership."

He went on to say the Acton Quarry landfill proposal is "unrealistic" because of its threat to groundwater resources.

But Mr. Whiting said the Province — and Mr. Elliot — have mismanaged quarries.

"I've been calling for legislation to ban garbage from (the Acton) dump since the last campaign," Mr. Whiting said.

He added that a private member's bill should have been introduced demanding such a ban. He said former Liberal MPP Julian Reed's bill helped enact legislation governing handicapped parking.

Mr. Duignan said government is being "driven by a narrow and self-interested agenda, ignoring what needs to be done."

He added while Ontario is a "great province ... how much greater it would be if it truly belonged to the people."

Mr. Duignan said his party would improve small business opportunities because "small business plays a vital role in the way New Democrats approach the economy."

He said it is time for the government to "ensure large corporations pay their fair share of the taxes."

Mr. Gori said government has to be made more responsible for its spending.

"All the major parties have forgotten one simple fact," he said. "Governments spend other people's money. The leaders of the major parties think that you are not intelligent enough to realize that when they are throwing money at a problem, it is your money."

Mr. Shadbolt said Ontario needs a dual speed limit system.

He suggested that, on roads like Hwy. 25, a speed limit up to 100 km/h just during the summer months.

Because the people of Ontario "can't afford all our taxes," government has to be streamlined, Mr. Shadbolt said.

The Halton North candidates will go head-to-head at a Milton all-candidates meeting tomorrow (Thursday) at E. C. Drury School auditorium. Doors open at 7 p.m.

Elliot angered by Gori's attack on integrity

An otherwise dull Halton North provincial election campaign had a wink of excitement at an all-candidates meeting in Acton.

Clearly frustrated by Giuseppe Gori's attacks on the integrity of the three main party leaders and on himself, Liberal Walt Elliot verbally assailed the Family Coalition Party candidate.

Throughout the campaign, Mr. Gori has claimed "the old parties are deceiving the people" and lack the leadership to make changes. He has championed himself as the only candidate with the moral principles necessary to represent the people of Halton North.

Thursday Mr. Gori levelled

another personal attack, saying "if you want to be represented by a person with integrity and morals, you must vote for me."

Mr. Gori said he did not "believe" Mr. Elliot's explanation of the government's recently introduced plan to reduce the provincial sales tax.

Mr. Elliot was clearly angered by the attacks, and in an emotional closing speech said, "when, by innuendo, people say that I and the people I work with don't have integrity, I get a bit upset."

"I'm pleased to run again ... I find it challenging and satisfying. I have a great deal of respect for all the people who run for office, and when guys like Gori take shots at me and my colleagues — Dave, John and Noel — they just

shouldn't be in the system."

Mr. Elliot was referring to Progressive Conservative Dave Whiting, Libertarian John Shadbolt and New Democrat Noel Duignan.

When Mr. Elliot sat down — still angry — Mr. Gori's attempt to speak to him was brushed off.

Mr. Gori defended his statements after the meeting, saying Mr. Elliot "misinterpreted my views."

"Integrity is a strong word and I meant a person (with integrity) is doing his best not to deceive the people." While critical of what he perceives as Mr. Elliot's inability to act on certain issues, Mr. Gori retreated from any insinuation that the Liberal candidate is morally lacking. "Personally, I think Walt is a man of integrity."
