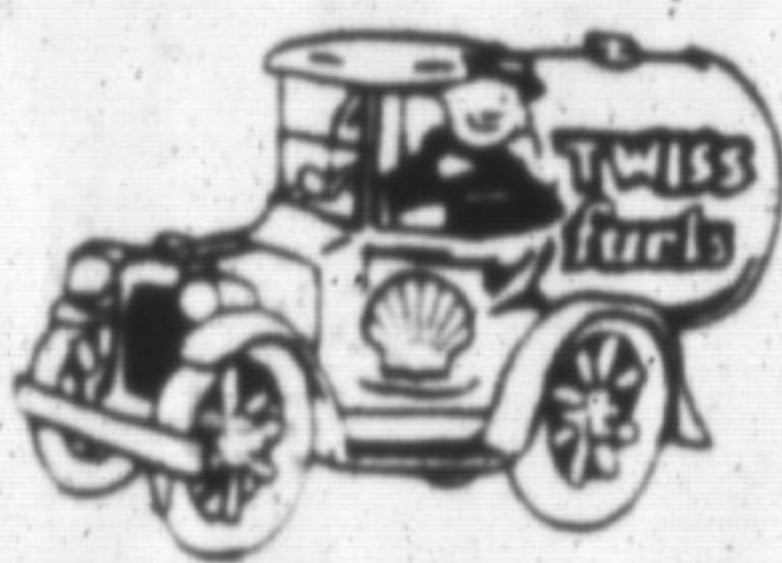

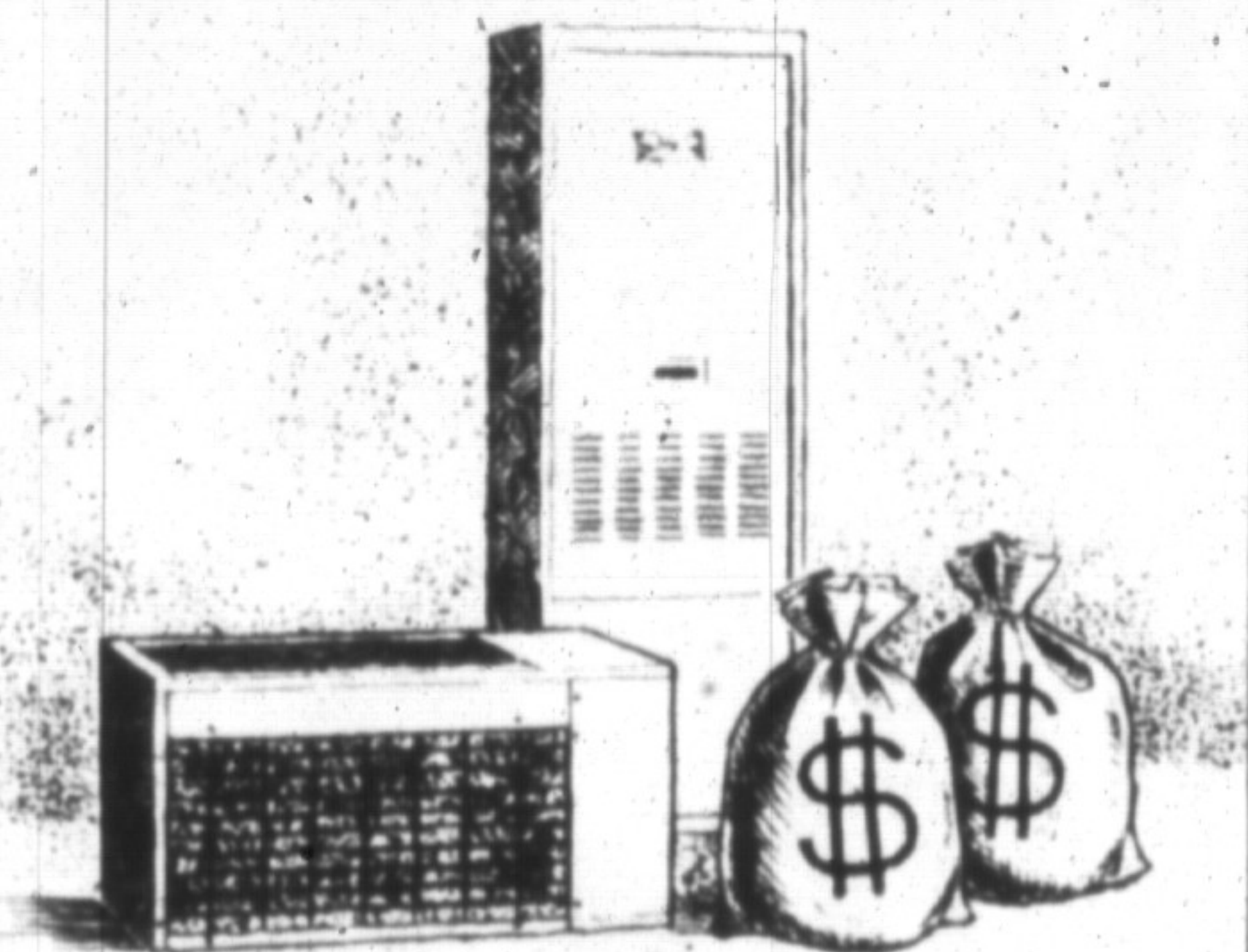

Decorating Wisely

How to recycle at home without mess

So you've decided to start recycling. It's the environmentally smart thing to do, and besides, your community may soon mandate it. But your best intentions could end up in messy piles on your kitchen floor unless you add a little planning to your convictions. It doesn't take long for newspapers and aluminum cans to pile up and spill out of the paper or plastic bags you've been tossing them into. Leaving a little food in those recyclable cans could provide a picnic for your neighborhood ants, and a smell that will prevent visitors from commenting favorably on your valiant efforts to help the planet.

While there's no single right way to organize for recycling, a little planning and knowhow helps. "The bottom line is recycling can be convenient as long as you develop a system that's right for you," says Jamie Hill, recycling program research analyst for the National Solid Waste Management Association.

It's relatively easy to make recycling as simple as throwing garbage away. First, find out exactly what is and isn't being recycled in your community. Some communities recycle plastic milk jugs and soda bottles. Others don't. Most recycle newspapers, aluminum cans and glass. Find out if you need to separate your newspapers from your glass and aluminum cans, or if you can throw everything in one bin. Your county or municipal solid waste office can provide this information.

You're going to need a place to put those recyclables until collection day, or until you have time to haul everything to the recycling center. If you need to sort aluminum cans from newspapers and glass, consider putting a set of stackable bins in your kitchen, pantry or anywhere else that will be convenient. You can designate separate bins for cans, bottles and newspapers, and eliminate the need for sorting later.

Tucker Housewares makes an entire Recycling System which consists of stackable frontloading bins with extra wide, unobstructed openings and lids that can be locked open or closed. The bins come in 12-, 16- and 20-gallon sizes so they'll fit into the space you have available. Tucker also makes the bins in colors to match municipal recycling bins. That's important if you have curbside pickup of recyclables, because the colored bins are easily recognized by collection personnel.

If your community has a "commingled" program and all recyclables go in the same container, a stacking bin system can work equally well and save on space. Simply use one bin for garbage and another for mixed recyclables.

A dolly, designed by Tucker Housewares to fit the stackable bins, makes it easy to transport the Recycling System to curbside (or to the trunk of your car for a trip to the recycling center).

Before you throw those recyclables in the bin, give them a quick rinse in cold water. This will get rid of food residue and will keep odors to a minimum. It's not necessary to run glass jars through the dishwasher. A better method is to give them a quick dunk in your dirty dishwasher.

Most recycling programs don't require you to peel labels off of glass jars. However, many do ask that you remove labels from soup and food cans, and that you take the plastic or metal tops and rings off of glass or plastic beverage containers. "It's good to do as you go along," says Hill. "Otherwise you've got hordes of things piling up and that's when it becomes a real irritant."

There are a few other things to be careful about when you separate out your recyclables. If your recycling program accepts glass, that doesn't mean it accepts ceramics.

"There's not a program in the country that wants your used coffee mugs or other ceramic pieces," says Janet Keller of Rhode Island's Department of Environmental Management. "The reason is simple. These types of things break in the trucks, making them impossible to retrieve. Once those pieces of ceramic or Pyrex make it into the glass furnace, they explode. That's a real serious and dangerous problem."

Plastic is another product you need to be careful about because there are so many different types. Entire loads of recyclables can be rejected and sent to landfills if the wrong materials end up in the mix.
