The Metro stakes race goes Saturday

Veteran harness horse trainer Gene Riegler will be seeing double when the \$797,400 Metro Pacing Stakes, Canada's richest harness race for two year olds, goes postward at Mohawk Saturday.

Two of Riegler's trainees will be chasing the pot of gold in The Metro.

Last Friday, despite the cool, crisp autumn temperatures, 21 freshmen went postward in three \$40,000 elimination events to compete for nine coveted positions in the final.

Riegler is responsible for the training of both elimination winners, Silky Stallone and Artsplace, and driver John Campbell guided both to winning efforts.

"He's a very versatile colt," said Campbell of Silky Stallone. "He can race on the front or he can race from behind. I didn't want to get caught in a speed duel so I took him to the back."

The win was Silky's fifth in 14 season starts and boosted his season's bankroll to \$204,728 on the year for Wilshire Hunter Newman of Lawrenceville, New Jersey.

Artsplace made it two for two for Riegler in the second elimination when he paced to a 1:54.7 victory with John Campbell at the helm.

For Artsplace, a son of Abercrombie, it was win number seven in nine season starts and increased his bankroll to \$106,182 for owners George Segal and Brian Morison of Chicago, Ill.

According to Riegler, Artsplace is a more mature colt than Silky but Silky has improved a lot more over the course of the season.

"Art's got a little advantage over Silky in the final," said Riegler, who is also hoping the two colts peak in the race.

"Mohawk's been good to me the last couple of weeks," admitted Riegler, who was referring to a win in the Champlain and a win in the Nasagaweya for Artsplace.

Campbell will drive Artsplace in the Metro final on Sept. 22 and Riegler will be looking for another driver, possibly Bill Fahy, to guide Silky Stallone.
