Railway danger topic of school safety week

Railway safety will be the focus of National School Safety Week Oct. 15-19. A program called You are on the Wrong Track informs children about the dangers of trespassing on railway property or playing on railway equipment. A special booklet has been designed to provide teachers, parents and

children with the opportunity to discuss railway safety. People of all ages are fascinated by railways. But young people especially

need to be aware of rail/highway crossing hazards.

The activity sheets in the booklet teach children that railway tracks and railway property are dangerous and not places to play. Safe behaviours practiced now will carry over into teen and adult years.

Each year in Canada, some 50 people are killed and an estimated 500 are injured in railway accidents. These accidents occur at all hours of the day and night, in rural and urban locations, and at rail/highway crossings with or without automatic warning devices.

The program is part of Operation Lifesquer, established 10 years ago by the Railway Association of Canada and Transport Canada. The Canada Safety Council has been associated with the program since is started.
