The Halton board budget for 1990 was 12.8 per cent higher than in 1989, an average tax increase of \$143 for education.

The jump was roundly criticized by area politicians.

## ATTENTION HALTON AGREEMENT FOREST USERS

Regional Council has CONTINUED the ban on hunting and the discharge of firearms within the Coulson Tract Agreement Forest. Described below are the periods of time when certain hunting and discharge of firearm activities are allowed in all other Halton Agreement Forests except the Coulson Tract.

Beginning October 15, 1990 through November 4, 1990 and from November 9, 1990 to December 31, 1990 inclusive ARCHERY HUNTING will be permitted. Archers may be in the Agreement Forests hanting deer and other small game if in season.

Beginning November 5, 1990 and continuing through November 8, 1990, SHOT GUN HUNTING will be permitted for deer and any other small game if in season. On these four days, archery hunting is NOT permitted in the Agreement Forests.

All users of the Agreement Forests are advised to exercise caution during the times that hunting is permitted.


