
"We played as well as we had to," said a less than contented Rick Bince, coach and general manager of the

Bince says he is going to ride with the team in its present configuration until something prompts him to make changes.



Equitation is a competition where the rider, rather than the horse, is judged on various equestrian concerns. The riders are judged on how they carry themselves in controlling the horse, jumping, and cantering, among others.
