- A break-in occurred at Trafalgar

Golf and Country Club just after midnight Thursday night with a small amount of cash taken. Entry was gained through a window.

- Police stopped a 23-year-old Campbellville resident on an off-road motorcycle in Campbellville on Saturday. Police say the bike was not licenced and the driver did not produce insurance. Police also charged the driver for providing false identification.

- Police and Milton fire department responded to a Thursday night fire deliberately set in a pile of cardboard cartons behind Harvey's on Market Drive.

- A 14-year-old E.C. Drury High School student went to ride home on his bike after school and found a wheel rim bent and the brake lines snapped.

- A colour television and four VCRs, valued at \$5,000, were removed in a break-in from the Sears of Canada outlet on Nipissing Road on Friday. Entry was gained by smashing a front door window.

- Sometime between October 7-20, while the occupants were away, a culprit pried open a rear window

and entered a residence on Sydney Street. It's unknown at this time if anything was removed.

- The Livery reported a break-in sometime overnight last Wednesday but apparently nothing was taken. Entry was gained by prying off several pieces of wood.

Cemetery vandals sought

Sometime overnight on October 1, 11 headstones were knocked over at Greenwood Cemetery, 100 King Street in Halton Hills.

The Halton Hills public works supervisor indicated several of the headstones were damaged. These headstones are more than 80 years old and irreplaceable.

Throughout Halton, more than 2,000 incidents of property damage have been investigated so far this year.
