Family fights gas pipeline on farm

A planned 11-kilometre expansion of the Union Gas pipeline from Ninth Line to just west of Highway 25 in Milton is fuelling the anger of a third generation farmer said. literally caught in the middle.

It's not the first time the Micallef family, which owns a 100-acre market farm on Sixth Line just south of Derry Road (across from Trafalgar Golf and Country Club), has been askedon to turn over land in the name of progress.

They didn't like it back in the early 1970s when the first two gas lines were put through, and estimate they spent as much as \$25,000 in an unsuccessful bid to keep them off their property.

They believed the pipeline was shuffled onto their property in order to avoid disrupting a small portion of the adjacent golf course. The eventual settlement, John Micaleff said, was less than \$7,000.

And now Union Gas is preparing to put in a third gas line which it plans to construct next summer.

Union Gas pipeline project manager Roger Piett explained in a telephone interview from his Chatham office that the Ontario Energy Board gave its approval in late August, after presiding over public hearings last November and February.

About 30 property owners are along the site. He said negotiations for use of the rights-of-way are "very seriously" underway and will hopefully conclude before

propriation process."

The issue came to a confrontation Monday when Union Gas sent employees to Mr. Micallef's property to do a survey. The family refused them entry.

The Micallets say they were not informed of the Ontario Energy Board hearings held last winter, and thus, their concerns were not addressed when the provincial

agency handed down its decision last summer in support of the Union Gas expansion.

Union Gas contends that all affected property owners were advised of the hearings by registered mail and that announcements were placed in the local media.

"He (Mr. Micallef) was served notice of the hearing by

registered mail," said Mr. Piett. He explained that the "Ontario Energy Board approval

gives us the right to enter his property to do a survey." The survey is needed in order to negotiate a settlement with the landowners, or failing that, for the expropria-

tion process. Mr. Piett said Union Gas informed both Mr. Micallef and his lawyer the previous week that it planned to do the survey last Monday.

"We showed up Monday to do it, and he wouldn't

allow us on the property." Mr. Piett added that the company will attempt to resolve the dispute. If the differences can't be resolved, he said, "we'll probably return within a week with the

assistance of the local police." Mr. Micallef said that when "gas mains cross a market farm, it is then not fit for horticulture use."

One problem, he said, is that after the pipe is put in, the topsoil and subsoil are mixed together, which is unsuitable for crops. Where the current pipeline goes If not, he said, "we'll be forced to proceed with the ex- through, he added, erosion has left the land three feet below normal

"It's bare, vacant land. You can't grow crops, can't dig wells. It would make a good drive-in theatre," he
