Pomeroy to spell out stand on garbage incinerator

Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy has promised a written response to a local environmental group's concern over where the Region of Halton stands on the controversial issue of garbage incinerators.

Dr. Ken Landry, a member of Incineration Counteracts the Environment (ICE), wants Halton Région to categorically reject accepting other regions' waste for incineration.

Burlington councillor Walter Mulkewich suggested that Halton's position on the matter is quite clear.

Halton has a three-pronged approach, all components of which are in preliminary stages. The first is tojoin with a plan by St. Lawrence Ce-= ment to burn garbage as fuel in its Mississauga plant; the second is a joint venture to build an EFW plant with one or more Toronto area Johnson, a staunch supporter of inmunicipalities; the third is for Halton to go it alone and build its own small scale plant.

This latter step actually led to the formation of ICE after some residents were surprised to learn the Region had already set aside more than a dozen potential sites in Halton.

Halton Hills councillor Marilyn-Sergeantson reminded Mr. Landry that Halton is required to investigate garbage incineration as part of the agreement allowing it to open its

new Milton landfill.

Still with ICE, the group, which is clearly opposed to incineration, adveftised a meeting last Thursday night as an opportunity to "get the facts about incineration.

which he doesn't necessarily agree with, but which are certainly welcome and helpful in the debate.

"I think it's very good these meetings are being held."

Suggestions for Rae

Halton Region has plenty of suggestions for Bob Rae in tackling the growing garbage crisis.

Some of the suggestions, approved by council Wednesday, include: · Ensuring landfill, approvals can

be received within five years by simplifying red tape.

· Advising municipalities about how they can meet ambitious provincial recycling goals now in place.

· Enacting legislation to encourage the use of reusable containers, to limit disposable products; to reduce packaging and require packaging to economically.

· Placing responsibility for wastes produced on the providers of goods. and services.

He's batting .500

Walter Burlington councillor Mulkewich is batting 500 in waste disposal proposals.

He received council's backing for a suggestion to form a citizen's recycling advisory committee. Staff was instructed to report back with the terms of reference.

However, another suggestion to combine all waste management responsibilites under one roof either at the regional or local town level - was shuffled off to a special committee reviewing the make-up of regional government.

Presently, waste management is split between the two tiers of local government. For instance, municipal government is responsible for collecting garbage, but the Region is responsible for disposing it.

The balance would be obtained from private sponsors, film funding agencies and broadcasters.
