The Beeliners got off to a slow start against Burlington and trailed 3-1 going into the second frame. Burlington opened the scoring at 2:46 of the first on a scramble in front of the net.

Milton came right back with a goal less than a minute later, with Fabio Pento jamming the puck into the short side following a passing play involving Kyle Arbuckle and Joey Rodrigues. Milton scored a quick goal 14 seconds into the middle frame as Justin Lynch took a centering pass from Greg Ollerenshaw to pull the Beeliners within one. Chad Broussard also assisted on the play.

Burlington restored their two goal margin late in the period to set up an entertaining third. At 1:08 defenceman Scott Hammill rushed in from centre and tested the Burlington goalie, a test he couldn't pass. Lynch fired the initial shot and Hammill was there to pot the rebound.

Burlington picked up an errant clearing pass in front of the Milton

net to again lead by two. Milton goalie Jeff Merk made the first save but had no chance on the rebound.

Milton kept coming and made it interesting, with Arbuckle scoring a powerplay goal with 2:34 remaining in the game. Douglas Frehs fed a great pass to Arbuckle, who was left unprotected in front of the net. Milton pulled their goalie for the extra attacker but couldn't get the equalizer.

The Beeliners got all aspects of their game going on Sunday in the 8-1 thrashing of Streetsville. Solid goal-tending, good defensive play and goal production from all forward lines resulted in the win.

The Hurricanes played 500 hockey in their three recent games, going 1-1-1 to put their record for the young season at 3-1-2.

They played host to Chinguacousy at Georgetown's Memorial Arena on October 16 and the teams finished deadlocked in a 2-2 tie. A swing to Burlington cost them their first loss of the season but the return engagement with Chinguacousy ended with a 3-1 win.

The small ice surface at Georgetown provided both sides with an opportunity to demonstrate their physical hockey skills. Orangeville player Todd Miller joined the Hurricanes squad, making the trip for Paul Neff, also from Orangeville, a little more enjoyable.

Miller was centering a line between Peter Mashinter and Andrew Hartholt. Jamie Walker was moved to the left wing with linemates Justin Davis and Darin Finlayson. Jamie Briggs swung back to defence and was paired with Jonathan Atley for the game.

Ching scored the only goal in the first period on a lob shot that benefitted by a deflection. As expected, it was a close checking and hard hitting affair.

The second period saw the rear-guards play a big part both offensively and defensively as Ryan Taylor, Colin Page and Atley pinched in to keep the pressure on in the Chinguacousy end. Tom Baynton and Jamie Briggs took advantage of some daylight to rush the puck well into the Chinguacousy zone, the puck came back to Paul Neff and Miller intercepted the shot and deposited it just inside the post to tie the game 1-1.

In the last seconds of the period, with Halton on a powerplay, Finlayson pisked up a Janjevich rebound but couldn't put it home. The third period started with the line of Hartholt, Mashinter and Miller striking early. Hartholt missed on a 15-foot shot but Mashinter fielded the rebound, passed out to Miller and he scored his second of the game.

Two shifts later Taylor made a diving check to strip a breaking Chinguacousy winger of the puck and the play set up a chance for Justin Davis, who was thwarted by a great toe save from the spread-eagled Chinguacousy goalie.

The game was tied at 2:23 of the third period on a broken play which left a Chinguacousy winger alone in front of the net. Jim Leworthy preserved the tie with a good pad save, robbing the Chinguacousy winger of the go-ahead goal. Janjevich had a chance in the dying seconds but was unable to capitalize.

The team took on Burlington with the teams looking evenly matched through two complete periods. Burlington was up two goals by the middle of the third frame.

At 14:05 of the final period Halton took a five minute major penalty followed by several minors and before it was over Burlington picked up four powerplay goals and the win.

The Hurricanes travelled to Chinguacousy last Wednesday for the return match of their series and Halton picked up an early lead which led to a 3-1 victory.

Just 48 seconds into the contest Halton scored when Jamie Briggs was set up in front of the net by Tom Baynton. Halton carried the lead into the third and had a couple of chances to add to their lead but couldn't convert. Sound penalty killing by the Hurricanes kept Ching off the board but with 1:38 remaining they finally put one in to rob Leworthy of his shutout.
