The Capitals remain undefeated and in sole possession of first place with a 3-0 record.

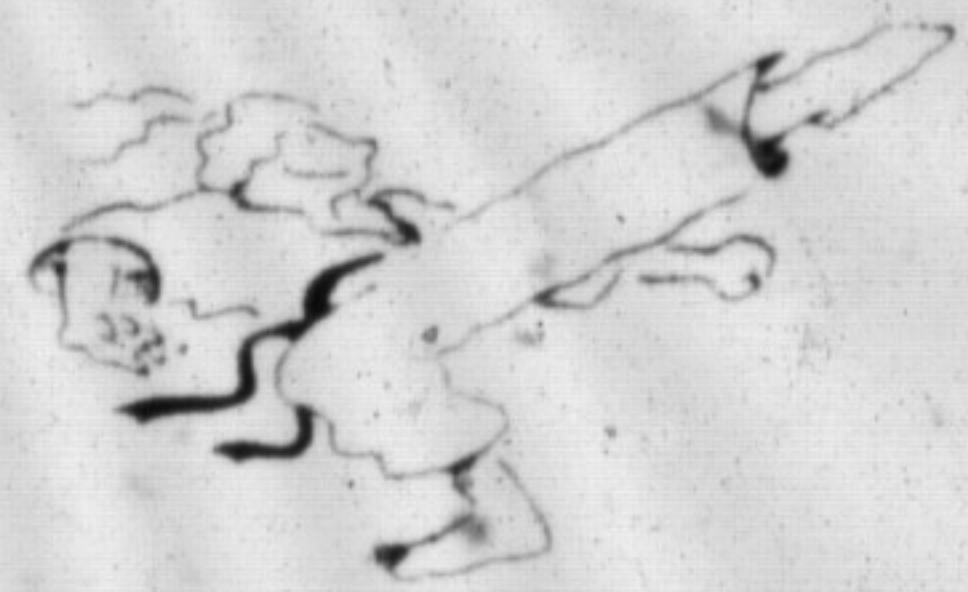
The Winterhawks are in second at 2-1, with the remaining four teams tied at one victory against two defeats.

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## Reding captures first ever Halton title

There will be other titles, but for Bishop Reding Roman Catholic Secondary School, the first is the best.

The senior girls field hockey team won the Halton title, the first in the five year old school's history in any sport, with a 2-0 victory over Assumption High School in Burlington Tuesday.

"A lot of the credit should go to Marg Dorio, who coached the team for four years," said rookie coach John Piccone. "The girls also did a super job playing with confidence. Even though we finished sixth in the standings we knew we were a better team."

Both goals against Assumption came in the second half. Maria Sweeney, a standout all season, knocked home the winner midway through the second half and Sara Hughes capped the victory with three minutes remaining in the game.

Hughes really came into her own during the crucial playoff march. Known primarily for her solid defensive abilities on the wing, she was held scoreless all season. In the playoffs she was a scoring machine, popping bingles in all three Halton playoff games against L.B. Pearson, Loyola and Assumption. She also scored a key goal against Barton Collegiate at the GHAC (Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference) semifinal last week.

The Halton Championship is not without its irony. Due to scheduling problems the GHAC final was played before the Halton final. Assumption and Reding, having both eliminated their Hamilton opponents, faced off for the right to advance to the provincial championships.

Assumption defeated Reding 1-0 in overtime at Shell Park in Oakville to take the GHAC title and a berth at the OFSAA (Ontario Federation of Schools Athletics Associations) championships.

Reding travelled to Assumption for the Halton title rematch, full of confidence. They had carried the play against Assumption in the GHAC final and knew what they needed to do to win.

A bus full of Reding fans travelled to Assumption for the game, some with their faces painted and others carrying banners. "The whole school was buzzing. Other students went down on their own and numerous staff members were also there cheering the girls on," said Piccone. "It was a school effort as much as it was a team effort."

Joanna Miller and Beatrice Bauer have been named to the Halton all-star team and will compete at the all-star game tonight (Friday) at Sherwood Park in Burlington.

Piccone says the team will only lose five members to graduation and several good juniors will be moving up. Bianca Bauer, Beatrice's sister, will join the senior team next year, coming off a season in which she won the Most Valuable Player award for her play on the junior team. Sandy Bauer, another sister, also plays for the seniors.

The juniors also won the Halton championship though their sport isn't officially sanctioned by the Board of Education. Their playoff system involved a one day tournament held October 22 in which they beat Georgetown 2-1 in the semifinal and L.B. Pearson 1-0 in the final to claim the title.

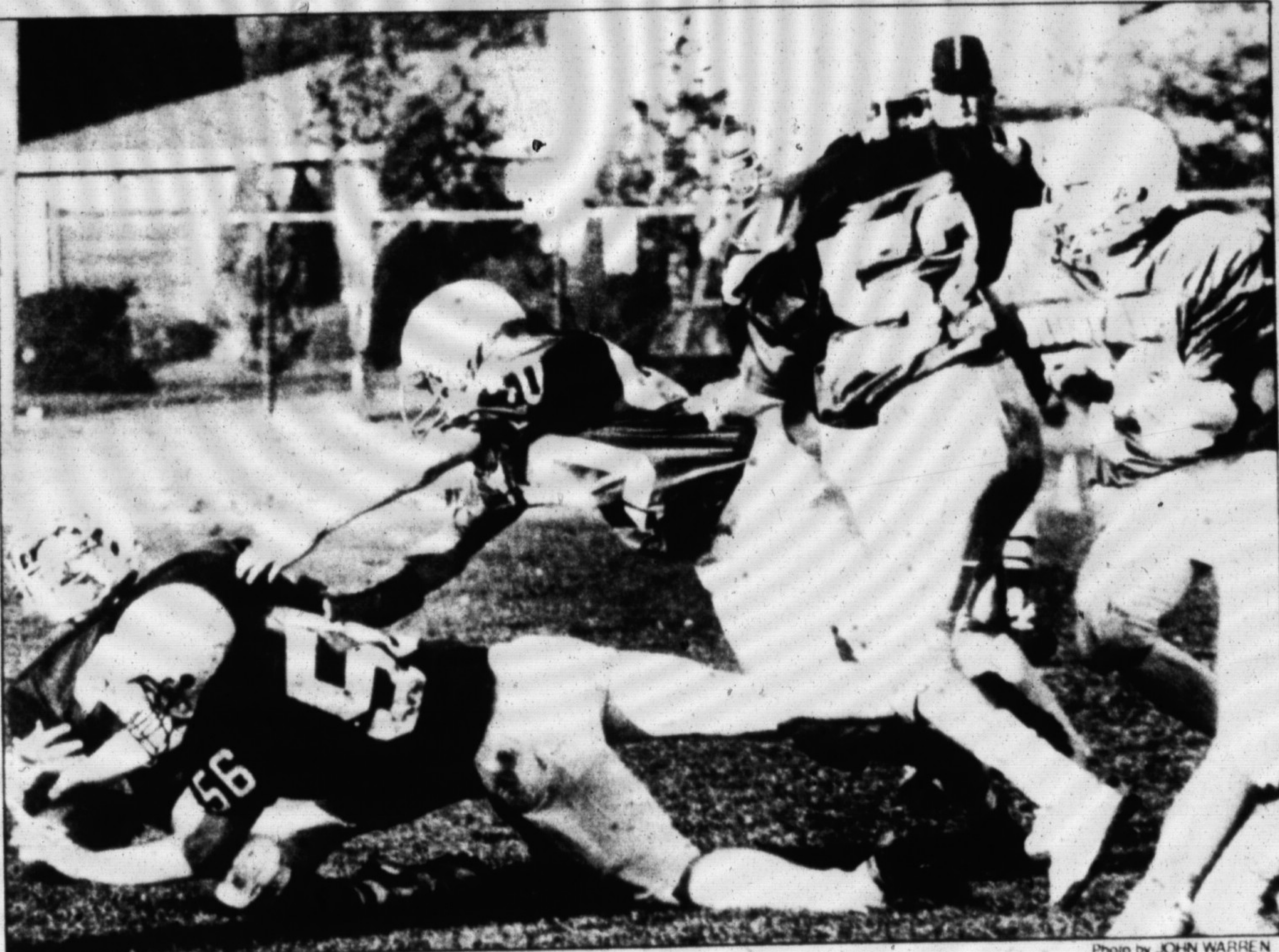

## Four MDHS cross-country teams qualify for OFSAA championships

Milton District High School qualified four cross-country teams to compete at OFSAA (Ontario Federation of Schools Athletics Association) in London tomorrow (Saturday).

Teams which finished first or second at the Golden Horseshoe Athletic Conference (GHAC) Championships last week at Kelso Conservation Area are eligible to run at the OFSAA meet.

Milton District's boys and girls midget teams, the junior boys and the senior girls all qualified.

Twenty-two of 29 Milton District cross-country runners will compete in the races.

Russ Fleming won the midget boys' race and led his team to a berth at OFSAA.

The team tied for first place but ended second in the tiebreaker format. David Bean, with his personal best time, finished eighth, Matt Medland was 11th and Jonathan Waddington was 28th.

The top four runners for each team count for the team totals.

Most teams send more than the minimum number of runners to the line but the Milton midget boys compete with the bare mini-

mum. An injury or illness could destroy their chances for a good showing.

The junior boys took the GHAC team title with Mike Gliddon finishing second, Chris Heipel eighth, Mike McPhail 10th, Ryan McLean 16th and Mitch Robinson 25th.

The senior boys were fifth, led by Kevin Wessinger's eighth placing.

Doug Woods was 38th, Sheldon Royce 47th and German exchange student George Raedler 52nd.

The midget girls team finished second overall and will go to OFSAA.

Vanessa King was third, Nia Llewellyn 14th, Janet Roussel 20th, Lorena Durrant 23rd and Kristen Hyslop 32nd.

The seniors also qualified for OFSAA, led by Diana Zavitz, who finished sixth. Dawn Hertz was seventh, Tara Laskosky 17th, Christina Dick 20th, and Lisa Bowler was 23rd.

The junior girls placed third as a team, just missing as an OFSAA qualifier. Hamilton's Westdale and Sir Allan McNab finished one-two.

Robin Ellison was eighth, Karen Johnston ended 11th, Melissa McQuaig was 14th, Tracy Faulknor was 17th and Christy Picard crossed 29th.

While only four runners count for each team, at OFSAA five team members are eligible to run and a sixth can be brought as a spare, in case of injury.

"We are very pleased with our success this year," said coach Pat Burroughs.

The senior girls are the surprise team. We had expected to qualify the juniors as well but they just missed.

"Russ Fleming should do well at OFSAA and so should Vanessa King," she added.

"All our teams should finish in the top half of the draw and the two midget teams could finish in the top quarter."

There are 234 runners in each race at the OFSAA championships, which is substantially more than at the Halton meet or even at GHAC.

Burroughs said the size of the field is daunting and can intimidate the midgets, who are going for the first time.
