No new dumps, group urges

A collection of Ontario environmental groups is demanding no more landfills or incinerators be built.

"It's the only thing we can do," said Rita Landry, a local environmental activist who handed out the proclamation at a Halton regional council meeting last week.

"There's no choice anymore. They're not calling it the turnaround decade for nothing."

A member of local groups such as POWER, ICE and Waste Not, she said the resolution was drafted at a recent conference on the environment, organized by Greenpeace, that was attended by numerous environmental groups from throughout On-

The information sheet, which contains her name as one of four contacts, criticizes the provincial government's waste management policy as being "dangerously flawed."

"If enacted," it states, "it would have a very detrimental effect on our communities, our environment, and especially on our precious water supplies. It is not only our own backyards being threatened, but it's everyone's backyard".

The coalition accuses Greater Toronto Area (GTA) municipalities of orchestrating a garbage crisis in order to avoid having to go through lengthy environmental hearings.

To solve the crisis, the six-part resolution, to be presented to Queen's Park, suggested:

· Opening up waste exchange and education facilities throughout Ontario. 'Facilities like these can achieve 84-90 per cent municipal waste (diversion) now.

 No new solid waste incinerators or landfills. "It has been proven that both landfill and incineration are detrimental to the environment. Landfilling and incineration are a poor use of our precious natural resources, and less cost effective than recycling when all factors are con-

· Public control of landfill and waste management. "The enormous revenue from waste handling, now attracting private proponents, must remain public revenue."

· Each municipality must be responsible for its own solid waste. "If your community is not responsible for its waste, it is not conscious of the amount generated - out of sight, out of mind."

· Dismantling the GTA's garbage disposal initiative, otherwise known as the Solid Waste Interim Steering Committee (SWISC). 'The GTA is undemocratic and unaccountable. Insertion of another tier of government

into waste management, where four levels of government now share authority, would only compound our problems. Keep the regional governments responsible (for waste mat-

· Removing subsidies for incinerators. "Finance waste management services in a manner that promotes fairness and encourages the diversion of waste disposal through the three R's."


