Eternal antifreeze

Antifreeze isn't going down the drain any more at Goodyear Certified Auto Centre. It's being

For the past year, the local service centre has been pumping used antifreeze through a Wynn Mark X antifreeze recycling unit. Antifreeze is filtered and rejuvenated with chemicals and then used again. This process can be repeated over and over.

Some antifreeze can't be recycled about 10 per cent. It's usually found in older radiators and contains high levels of sediment. Tom Pollard, owner of Goodyear Auto Centre, says there have been no problems with the effectiveness of the recycled antifreeze.

"Eventually it will be law that antifreeze has to be recycled. You won't be allowed to dump it down the sewer any more," he suggests.

The process entails draining the antifreeze into a holding tank where it is filtered and regenerated with the addition of chemicals.

Mr. Pollard says it takes up to an hour to complete the recycling and to pressure check the cooling system and examine belts and hoses.

The recycled antifreeze costs the same as new fluid, however the savings are reflected in what doesn't go down the drain.

Ms Bucher developed a strong interest in the party simply from what she heard through friends and the media - so she joined the Calgary organization through the mail. She described herself as having been a card- carrying Progressive Conservative who had voted PC all her life but "no more.

The bulk of the membership is coming from the PC party," said Ms Bucher.

"It (the Reform Party) is appealing to their sense of betraval.

"I just get mad at the PCs," she explained. 'They're just not acting like the PC party. There's no distinction between them and the Liberals. What the Reform Party stands for appeals to me."

Ms Bucher said the volunteers now working in Oakville-Milton feel the same way.

'They're very enthusiastic, very angry at Brian (Prime Minister Mulroney) and very angry at the system," she explained. Their goal right now is to compile a full slate of candidates aeross Canada for the next federal election.

Reform Pary policy planks include In 'Oakville-Milton, there are al- a "Triple-E" Senate, the holding of referendums on major issues, entrenchment of property rights in the constitution and the limitation of compulsory bilingualism to "key" federal institutions.


