A challenge has been issued to all local woodworkers to supply hand-made wooden toys to the Jaycees' Toy Drive.

The charitable toy collection drivehas a new chairperson this year who is sales manager for Shopsmith Canada. Greg Smith says customers of his company are donating beween 200 and 300 wooden toys to the local toy drive.

There are more than 600 children in Milton who will need toys provided through the fund to the Salvation Army. Each child usually receives four toys ranging in value from \$5 to \$25 That's a total of 2,400 toys and a price tag of \$27,000.

have been pushing for more resources for a number of years but couldn't seem to get anybody's attention."

The government "made the best decision it could make at the time" given the "great competition" for provincial funds, he added.

According to Mr. Treleaven, 70 more Crown attorneys will probably be hired across the province, to support the increased number of judges. "I would assume Halton will get one judge and will get two assistant Crown attorneys."

Of the 70 new Crown prosecutors, 32 are to be hired "in the near future" and 38 "down the road," Mr. Treleaven said.

Mr. Treleaven, who expects to get further clarification of government plans sometime this week, said he has already told Halton Crown attorney Paul Stunt to begin looking for two additional prosecutors.

Those two people, however, may move around somewhat in the area Mr. Treleaven supervises, which extends well beyond Halton, as circumstances dictate. It will depend on where they are seen to be needed most, he said.

The provincial government is considering options such as the establishment of "blitz" courts in areas with substantial backlogs, to hasten trials for cases involving charges such as impaired driving. As well, night courts and late afternoon courts may

be created in more areas. Mr. Treleaven said those options probably won't be needed in Halton.

The regional director for Crown attorneys said it "will be June before we get over the mad scramble" to clear backlogs in Halton, even with the new measures.

Mr. Treleaven also said that once the backlog is cleared, he doesn't anticipate taxpayers will be burdened with an overstaffed judicial system. Attrition is a major factor with judges, he pointed out, noting that 11 will retire in the next year. Also, many of the districts enduring problems at present are high-growth areas surrounding Toronto, he said, and the rapid population growth is expected to continue.


