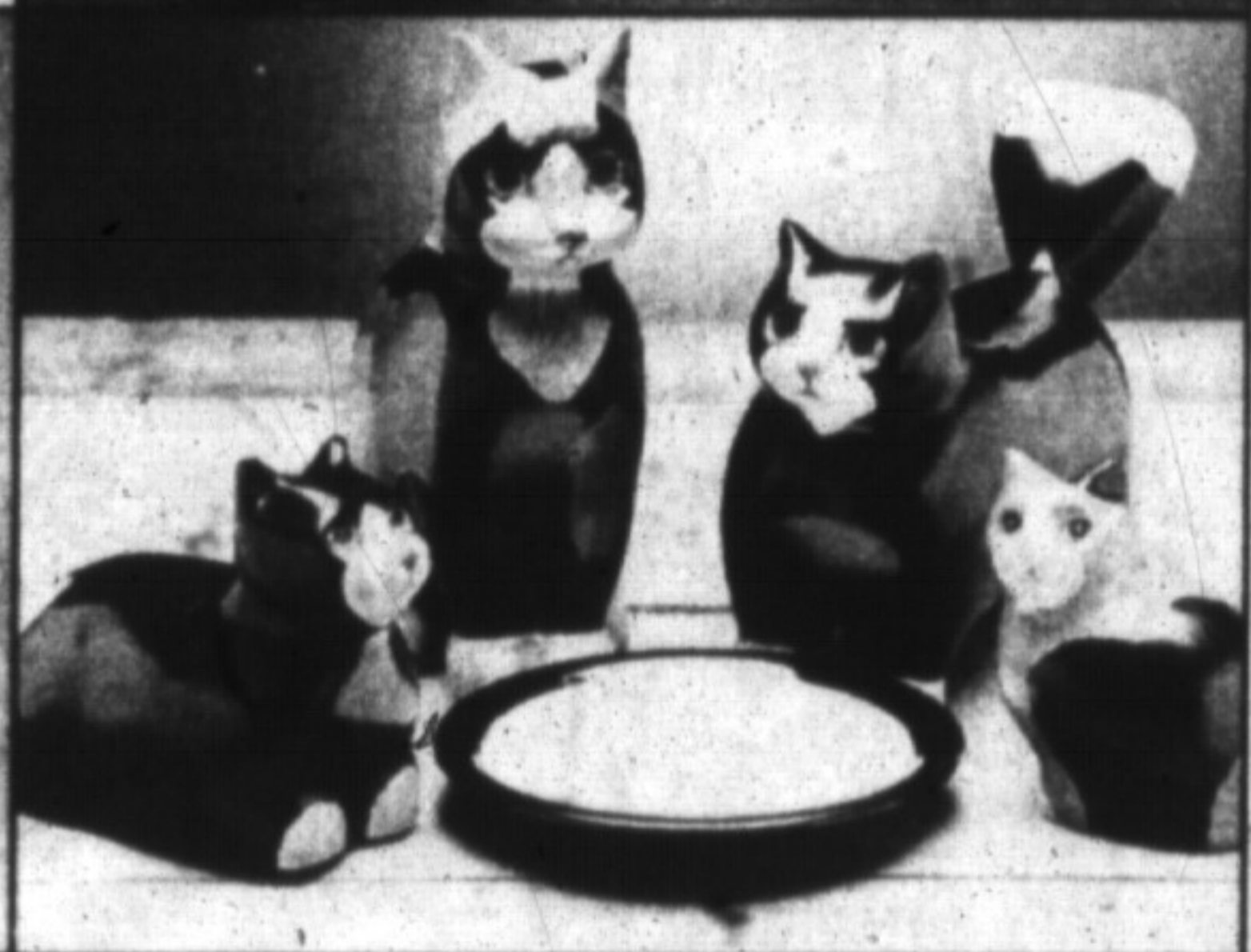

# Agricultural society opens exhibition hall

Fri. Sept. 23, 1864, Milton West- About 11 a.m. today our little town was attracted by the playing of the Queen's Own Band, which proceeded to Wallace's Hotel, playing all the way up Main St.

A large crowd gathered for the dedication and opening of the new agricultural exhibition building.

The Agricultural Society of the County of Halton has erected the building on eight acres of land which it has purchased as a permanent show ground and which it intends to improve and fit up as means may permit. The commodious frame building, ornamental in its exterior appearance, is 40 feet wide and 80 feet long. The posts are 22 feet high giving ample room for a gallery which runs around the interior of the building.

The crowd went into the Hall and the proceedings started at 3 p.m. Joshua Norrish, President of the County Agricultural Society, presided. Rev. Tremayne opened the proceedings with prayers supported by the 500 present.

Col. Thompson, who founded the Provincial Association, congratulated the County for the very credible building for the display of its agricultural and mechanical productions. He urged the necessity of leaving room for the display of the handiwork of the ladies, saying we should be careful not to neglect the ornamental, while we attended to the useful.

He spoke of the great changes which had occurred in the last 40 years. As he rode from the station he had observed magnificent farms and buildings.

Professor Buckland, of the University of Toronto, spoke of the great improvement of the country and town since his last visit some eight years before. Talking of a recent trip and items of agricultural interest he saw in the United States, he suggested more attention be paid to the dairy. He reviewed efforts in the United States in cheese making. There a number of farmers agree to provide their milk to some two or three parties who agree to furnish the building and machinery. They charge one cent a pound for making. Prof. Buckland spoke at length on other items of agricultural interest.

Milton Reeve James McGuffin came forward to honor W.C. Beaty. In an address he reviewed that while the crowd is assembled to inaugurate the new hall it recognized the great improvements in agricultural development of the county which could be attributed to the energy, active efficiency and ability which Mr. Beaty provided as secretary of the Agricultural Society for a period of eight years. The premiums now paid by the society are double the amount of those paid when Mr. Beaty was first appointed.

A watch and chain were presented by a number of friends as a testimonial to mark "in some degree their appreciation of your valuable services in the cause of agriculture in this county."

Mr. Beaty expressed his appreciation. "It is always a source of gratification and encouragement when honest efforts to perform a public duty are appreciated... I cannot take to myself all the credit... The performance of my duty as Secretary has afforded me pleasure which has been increased by witnessing the progressive success of the Society's influence upon the material interest of the County."
