Major peewees nip Brampton to capture regional Silver Stick

The major peewee AAA 'Canes managed much success in recent games, nipping Brampton 6-5 in league play before winning the Regional Silver Stick Tournament in Chinguacousy and having a fine showing at the 20th annual Oshawa Tournament.

The team has only been together three months but has managed to win two of four tournaments. In the Silver Stick qualifier they managed 17 goals while allowing only four.

In their first contest they battled North York Canadiens to a 3-3 tie. The Hurricanes led 3-0 by the 7:24 mark of the second but with 2:47 left in the game the Canadiens started a comeback. It would see them tie the contest with four seconds remaining. Marc Boucher, Jeff Haydar and Danny Davidson scored the goals. Assists went to Bobby Wilson with two and Daryl Loader with a single.

The Hurricanes managed a tight 1-0 victory over Brampton in their second game. Brampton plays a physical game and it came back to haunt them in this contest as their coach during the first period.

Halton crushed Mississauga Terriers 9-0 to claim the divisional title and move on in the tournament. Steve Heinz chalked up his third shutout of the season as his teammates allowed only four shots to trickle through to their netminder.

Halton opened the tourney with a 2-2 tie against Toronto Red Wings. Halton is in second place in the Central League while the Red Wings are in second place in the MTHL.

Halton failed to take advantage of numerous power-play opportunities in the first two periods. Sanderson tipped in a Loader pass at 1:36 of the first for a goal that looked like it might stand as the only Halton goal. & Toronto managed a pair to lead 2-1.

Halton fans had practically given up hope when, after a period of narrow misses, two good scoring opportunities were whistled down in the last minute. With scant seconds on the clock Loader shot the puck at the Red Wing goaltender from the corner. The puck took an odd turn, hit the goalie and bounced in. There was only one second on the clock.

Halton beat Nepean 7-0 in their next contest. The first two periods were a cakewalk for Halton as netminder Heinz barely had to make any stops. In the third period, Nepean peppered him with shots in a complete turn of events.

The 'Canes managed four power play markers with Sandifer, Wilson, Bertoli and Boucher notching the goals. Iain Macintosh netted the game winner with Sandifer and Bertoli scoring their second each. Bertoli picked up the game MVP honours.

The next day the Hurricanes travelled back to Oshawa for an early game against the Chicago Young Americans.

In an aggressive match, the locals went down 4-2. Hockey smarts, rather than ability took this contest as Chicago capitalized on an excellent ability to read the play, intercept passes and force errors. All four Chicago goals came on Halton errors or split-second decisions.

Down 3-0 early in the third the Halton power play came to life. A quick pass from Loader to the point and a blast from Kuhn's stick and Bertoli's tip started a comeback at 5:26.

With a two-man advantage due to some illegal stickwork Halton narrowed the gap to 3-2 at the 14:00 mark as Sanderson popped one in from Loader and Haydar. But less than two minutes later a shorthanded goal by Chicago sealed Halton's fate.

Although their match with Brampton at Memorial Arena ended in a lopsided score, the game was a tossup going into the last period with Halton holding a slim 3-2 lead.

Early in the third the Maroons tied the score 3-3, jolting the Hurricanes. into high gear and resulting in six unanswered goals for Halton and writer's cramp for the timekeepers. The turning point in the game came after a crushing open ice hit by Jonathon Atley, followed up by bonejarring checks from Tom Baynton and Curtis Carr.

Halton opened the scoring at 5:26 of the first on a 20-footer by Doug Janjevich, set up by Justin Davis. Brampton tied the game 1-1 at 4/33 with a hard shot in off the post and at 1:38 scored on a powerplay to take a 2-1 lead. This score held up until 2:54 of the second, when Atley took a pass from Janjevich and fired a slap shot from the point to beat the Brampton goaltender on the short side and tie the game at 2-2.
