

# Will the future unfold here on the weekend?

Mystery surrounds a Steeles Avenue banquet hall today — the site of the Milton Psychic Fair.

More than a dozen psychics, soothsayers, and vendors of astrology products from across Ontario and the United States will be on hand at the three-day event.

Visitors can learn about their past, present, and future through a tarot card reading or palmist, said Grant Powell, a founding member of the organization which is putting on the

show — the Total Awareness Group.

Other psychics will perform psychometry, which involves a reading through a personal object owned by the client, according to Carol Clark, another founding member, who uses the method.

Ms Clark, who now lives in Stayner near Wasaga Beach, is a former 20-year resident of Milton — one of the reasons the show is being held here. She explained, "I found Milton open to new ideas, not closed."

The Muddy Duck Banquet Hall,



where the event is taking place, has received 100 calls from people inquiring about the fair, she added.

One exhibitor from the Milton area is Josephine Clark of Martin Street, who will sell crystals and books on new age subjects. Ms Clark said the attractive stones "help healing."

She said by displaying crystals around her home, the rocks helped cure her aching back, which doctors said required an operation.

"Crystals keep watches working correctly so it only makes sense that they would help people," she said.

Many people who attend psychic fairs are not only interested in find-

ing out the direction their life is heading, said Mr. Powell. They want to grow spiritually, he added, and some are down on life and just need somebody to talk to.

Computer readings and lectures will also be part of the fair, which opens at noon today and runs until 10 p.m. Saturday, the event is open from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m., and Sunday from 11 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Admission costs \$4 for adults and \$3 for seniors and students. Children under 12 are admitted free.

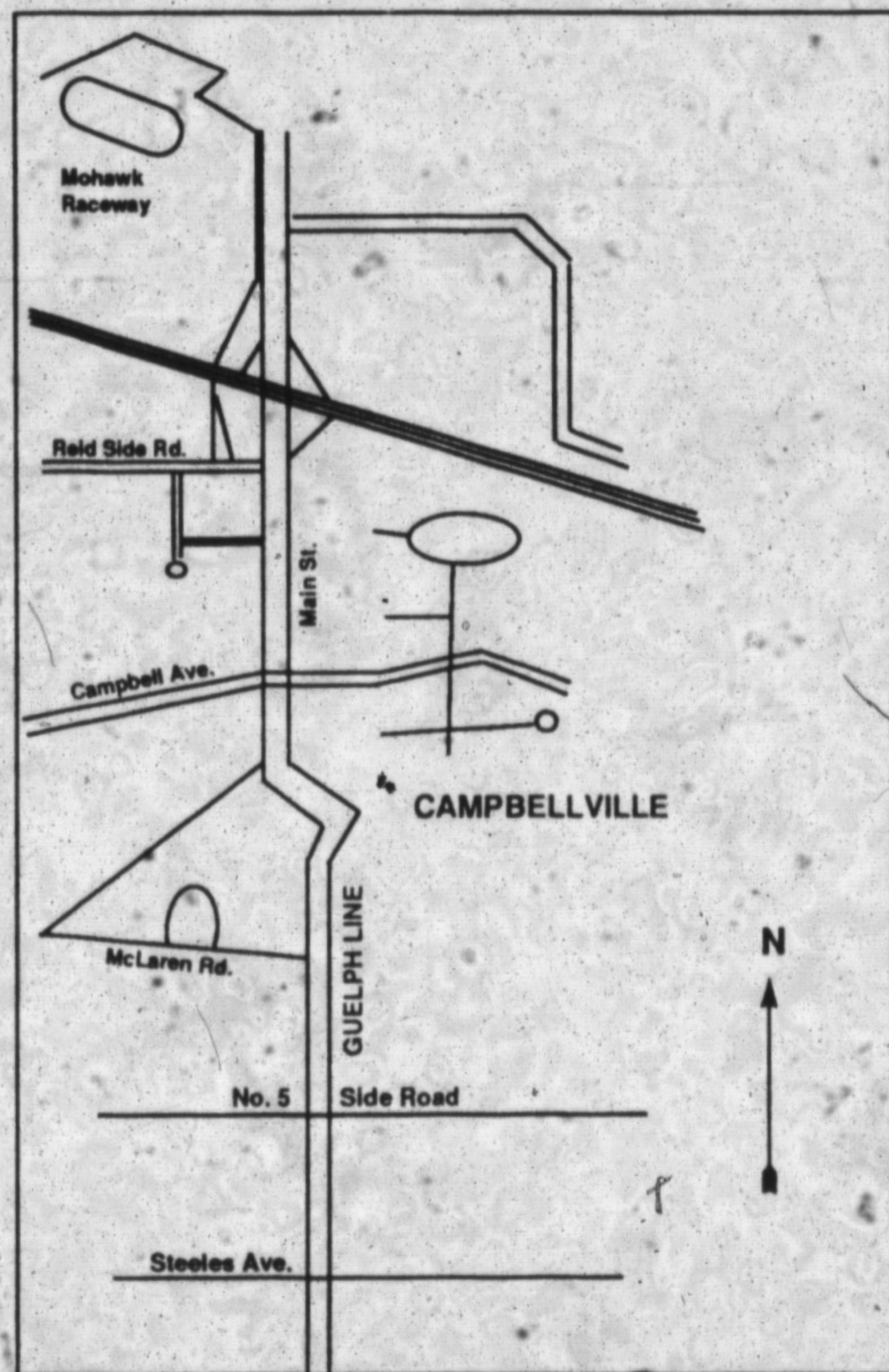
