Manning lists reforms

and a throng of national and Toronto media.

Mr. Manning said the Reform Party aims "to bring about a reduction in government spending in absolute terms to the point where it reflects itself in lower taxes, a lower cost of living and a lower cost of doing business in this country."

He took aim at government subsidies to the private business sector saying the annual \$4 to \$5 billion in direct government subsidies could be as much as \$25 billion a year indirectly through other tax concessions and subsidies.

"I think most business people would accept if it was done in such a way that it was applied vigorously and right across the board," said Mr. Manning.

The Reform Party, he said, would also trim the size of the federal civil service. He called for "downsizing similar to what many corporations and manufacturers have had to go through to be internationally competitive."

By way of comparison, Mr. Manning said Canada has 40 ministries and departments while Britain has 22 departments and the United States has 14 federal departments.

"I don't advocate throwing large numbers of civil servants out on the streets," said Mr. Manning, who suggested a relocation, retraining, refinancing program for such workers. He even called for a pilot program of civil servants willing to participate.

The Reform Party leader suggested money for such a program would ideally come from the private sector.

Under Mr. Manning's proposal, the private sector would also pay for retraining in a "labour adjustment mechanism" that would be part of a

three-part solution (tax level equalization with the U.S. and economic equalization) that would make free trade workable.

Business, labour and the government would have to reach agreement that would facilitate movement of employees from one sector to another, he said.

Mr. Manning was critical of the 60 per cent of federal government expenditures on social programs. He charged there's no way spending will be cut until some social programs are cut.

"We should target social spending to those in need not to indiscriminate universality," said Mr. Manning.

He went on to say the children of most of the middle-aged audience members Tuesday, will discover that they can't afford the senior population in the future anyway. The burden should be lifted off them now, he said.

On constitutional reform, Mr. Manning said, "The Reform Party supports constitutional reforms that will strengthen economic performance, property rights entrenchment, constitutional limits on unbalanced budgeting; strengthening the federal power to break interprovincial barriers to trade."

The Reform Party leader said the constitution should be taken "off centre stage". Hearings and debate over the complete re-writing of the Constitution should be conducted by an elected national Constituency Assembly whose findings would be subject to a national constitutional referendum, according to Mr. Manning.

The Reform Party believes a completely re-written Constitution would see the emergence of a new Canada and a new Quebec, if it wanted to stay within Canada.

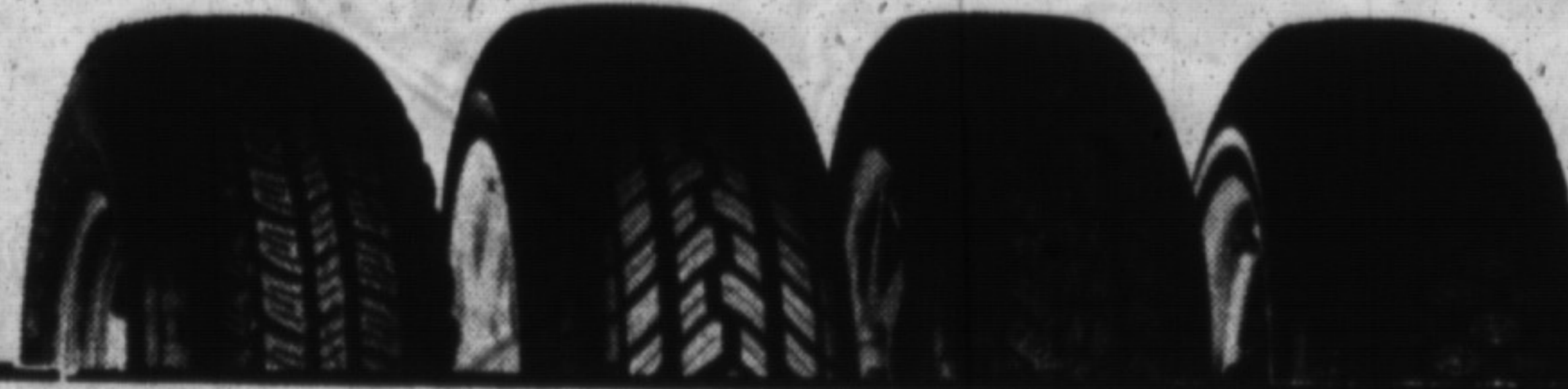

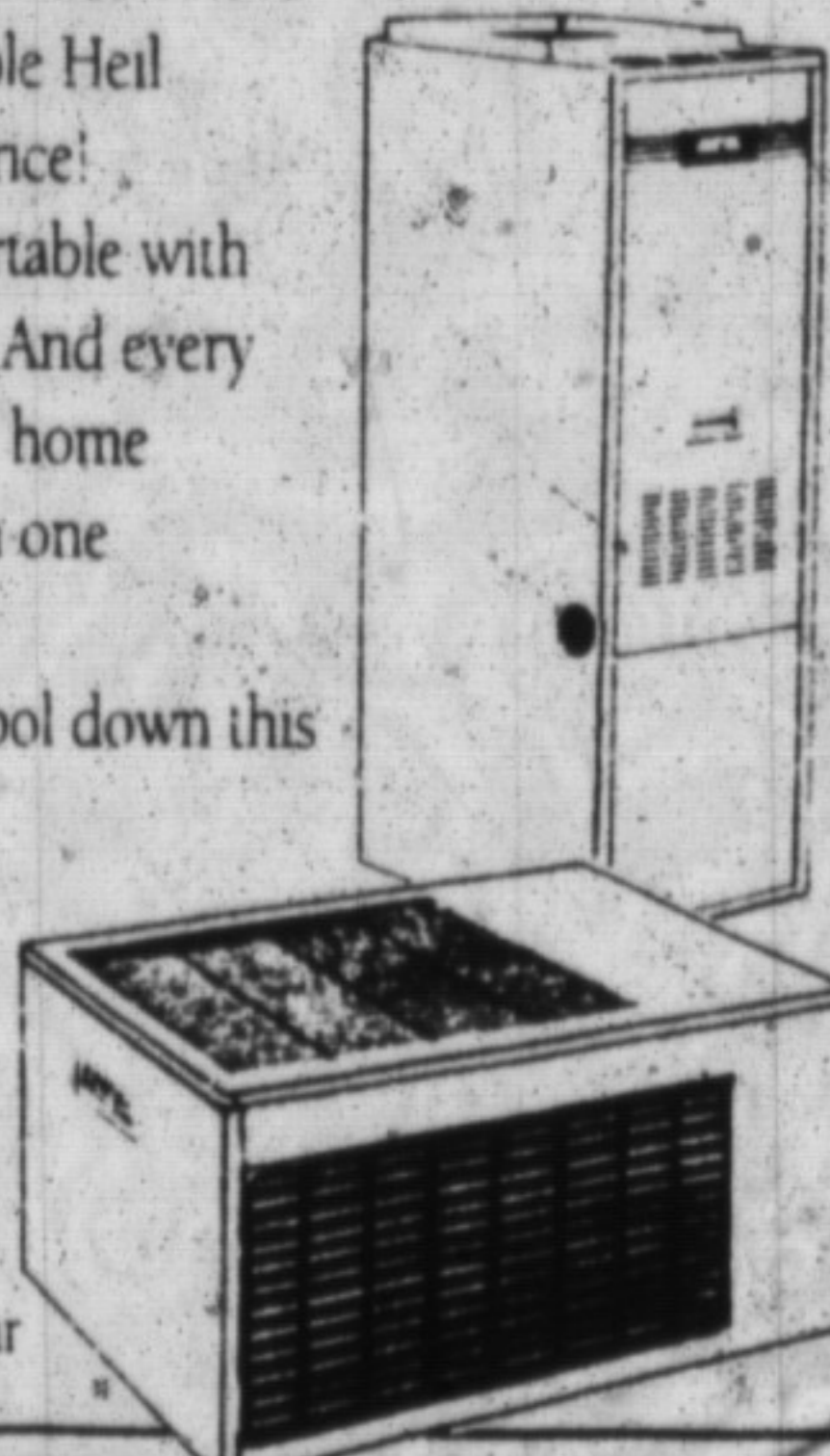
