Awareness helps reduce violence

Forum told attitudes are changing for the better

While violence both in and outside of the home is an increasing problem, there is some good news.

Social attitudes toward sexual assault are changing for the better, said Constable Janice LaRose during a public forum at E.C. Drury High School Tuesday night.

"People are more aware of what is acceptable and not acceptable behaviour," she said. "There is also more focus on the treatment of offenders."

Halton Regional Police were invited by the E.C. Drury Athletic Association to give a presentation on violent crime. About 70 adults and students attended to learn what they can do to protect themselves.

Addressing the concern of physical abuse, including sexual assault, Ms LaRose said an assault is any form of violent behaviour inflicted by one person on another, man or woman.

One in 10 women, though, are being abused by their partners on a continuous basis, she said. 'Physical abuse can result in death.

Ms LaRose explained the difference between rape and sexual assault. 'It (sexual assault) is not necessarily the same as rape," she said.

"Rape specifically refers to unwanted sexual intercourse. Sexual assault is any unwanted act of a sexual nature. In other words, it is any assault with sexual undertones."

Date rape, the common turn for a sexual assault which occurs during a dating or social situation, was a topic particularly of interest to the teenage audience, although women of all ages can be victims.

Mr. LaRose told men not to put pressure on a woman to have sex. "You can have a successful social encounter without scoring," she said.

She also told the male members of the audience not to assume what a woman wants, and speak up "if you are getting a double message. If you are still confused don't have sex with her."

A woman in the crowd questioned the recently removed rape shield law which means a sexual assault victim's sexual history can now be revealed in court.

She said many rape victims won't come foward for fear their sexual history will become public knowledge. But Ms LaRose said special circumstances must be in

place before defence attorneys can use such information see ATTITUDES on page 5




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
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
