perience and reputation come into it. Stubbs is currently in Florida where one of her thoroughbreds, Lordly Ruccus, is racing, while she is competing with another in an international dressage qualifier.

As for those people who claim that equestrian events aren't real sports Stubbs points out that in the ancient Olympics chariot racing was the premier sport, that horses have been aound the Olympic Games for a very long time.

"Horse events have a history," she says. "That's more than you can say about a lot of modern day sports."

Stubbs practices with a horse for about an hour each day and she will often work with more than one horse as she must tighen up her routine with her competitive horse and train younger horses. It takes several years to get a real feeling for competition with a new horse.

"One Olympics for a horse is usual and if the horses' age is right you might get in two Olympic Games." Occasionally a horse will remain hale enough to compete in three Olympic Games.

Stubbs says her most memorable moment came in finishing in the top 10 at Montreal. "It was in my own country and only the second time a Canadian had managed a top 10 finish."

She claimed the Olympics are very different from the Pan American Games primarily because of the sheer size of an Olympic contest and the fact that the Europeans are there Brampton on the weekend. to compete against.

Her first Olympics in Munich were strange because of terrorist murders of members of the Israeli team.

"I heard the shots," Stubbs says. "We were up at about 5:30 a.m. in the Olympic Village because our event took place at a castle some miles away. Theard what I thought were champagne corks and firecrackers from the parties that went on at all hours but I know now they were gun shots."

"They didn't tell us about what was going on and because we were so far away we were about the only event that went off that day, but we knew something was up as there was nobody there to watch us. No other competitors were there. Even the Queen (Elizabeth) wasn't there

because Prince Michael of Kent had died suddenly. We were about the only event that went off that day."

"We found out after the competition. They wouldn't let the bus near the village so we had to walk the last two miles and then talk our way into _ the compound."

Stubbs was once told that she go wasted all her education by deciding No against teaching but she counters, saying that it's never lost, it's just a matter of application. Recently she was at Eden Park in Milton where she gave private lessons to eight stu-

"With teaching, judging and competing, I'm booked up every weekend until the end of September," she said.

"And I work this farm. Horses here are number one because they do something. They aren't just lawn ornaments."

With that Stubbs walks into the stables to finish some last minute preparations before she joins her horses in Florida. There she'll be all business, readying horses for competition, teaching and looking forward to her next spin on the merrygo-round.


