H LAUGHTER IS LIKE medicine, the Milton Player -Theatre Group's latest production is the perfect cure.

Cheaters isn't about people filing crooked tax returns. It's about infidelity, and it's hilarious.

Four middle-aged people trying to recapture the passion they've lost in their lives end up finding themselves in

compromising situation only Houdini could get out of. Meanwhile,

couple young living together struggle as they battle over commitment separation.

But the success this comedy **Louise Prevost** relies actors' abilities to deliver the relentless one-liners and insults that cut like a

To a tee, the cast of the amateur theatre company pulls off this feat in the two-act play which is currently being staged at the St. Clair Masonic

knife.

Louise Prevost returns to the stage with the Players for the first time in three years, luckily with some armtwisting from her husband, Steve, who also stars in the American-written play.

She portrays the snobbish Louise who desperately tries to convince her lover to leave his wife. It would be a shame if Mrs. Prevost makes Milton audiences wait another three years to enjoy her wealth of talent.

The knee-slapping antics of seasoned actor Wilf Brookes in his role as 54year-old Sam makes for a fun evening. The cowardly Sam engages in adultery for the first time with Grace, played by four-year Players veteran Susan Cran-

Ms Cranford, too, masters the art of comedy while the shy and soft character she plays gains sympathy from the audience. Grace is lorded over by her 56-year-old Archie Bunker-style husband Howard who is portrayed magnificently by Steve Prevost - a gifted actor who is no stranger to community theatre in this area.

Appearing in his second consecutive well. Players production (he starred in Children), Rick Knight is just as entertaining this time around. He plays Allen, the boyfriend of Michelle who has her sights set on marital bliss.

Gabriele Richter makes her debut with the Players as Michelle, but she is only a rookie on paper. Ms Richter is to
