EDITORIAL COMMENT

This is our kind of town

This week we'd like to highlight some of the positive aspects of life in Milton which we all take for granted — just because they're always with us.

Here's a short list, undoubtedly incomplete, just a sampling really, of things we like about this community:

The best and most varied natural attributes Halton Region, or anywhere in the Greater Toronto Area, has to offer are a stone's throw away in local conservation areas. They include a lake big enough for sailboarding as well as swimming, a beach, a series of nature trails, a waterfall, a rockclimbing cliff face, a ski hill, a herd of buffalo, an ancient Indian settlement and a bird sanctuary.

The Saturday morning farmer's market downtown features prime produce and the opportunity to just gently mingle in a pleasant setting.

There are no traffic jams in Milton — yet — unless something breaks down.

Urban kids can bicycle to the school he or she attends in a few minutes if they so choose, and many can walk.

Although we paid a lot of money for them, we've got the prettiest municipal buildings in the area, and probably the province.

There's no part of the town that could by any stretch of the imagination be called unsafe.

We've retained a small-town atmosphere despite the fact we're in a rapidly growing major urban zone of 4 million people, and

despite the fact we're only 20 minutes from the country's busiest airport and largest city.

We've got some of the same problems as other suburban communities — drugs, crime, ethnic tension — but we don't have them anywhere near as significant a measure as most.

Milton's still a community, not just a collection of suburban divisions conveniently cramped together to serve commuters.

We've got a new leisure centre without going dangerously into hock over the project.

You can walk down the street and know a good many of people you run into, or at least you can say 'hello' to them without getting a suspicious look.

You don't have to stand in line very long, if at all, to get a licence sticker or do a bank transaction.

You can browse through a picturesque village and shop (even on Sunday, horrors) only 10 minutes away in Campbellville.

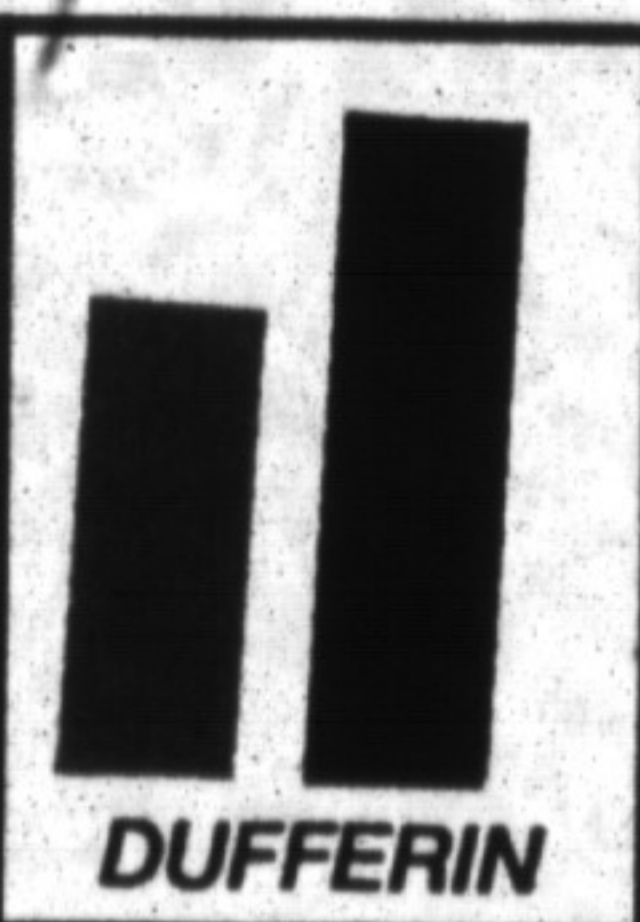
If you're a wagerer, you can go to the race track there too and see some of North America's top pacers and trotters.

DUFFERIN QUARRY BRIDGE

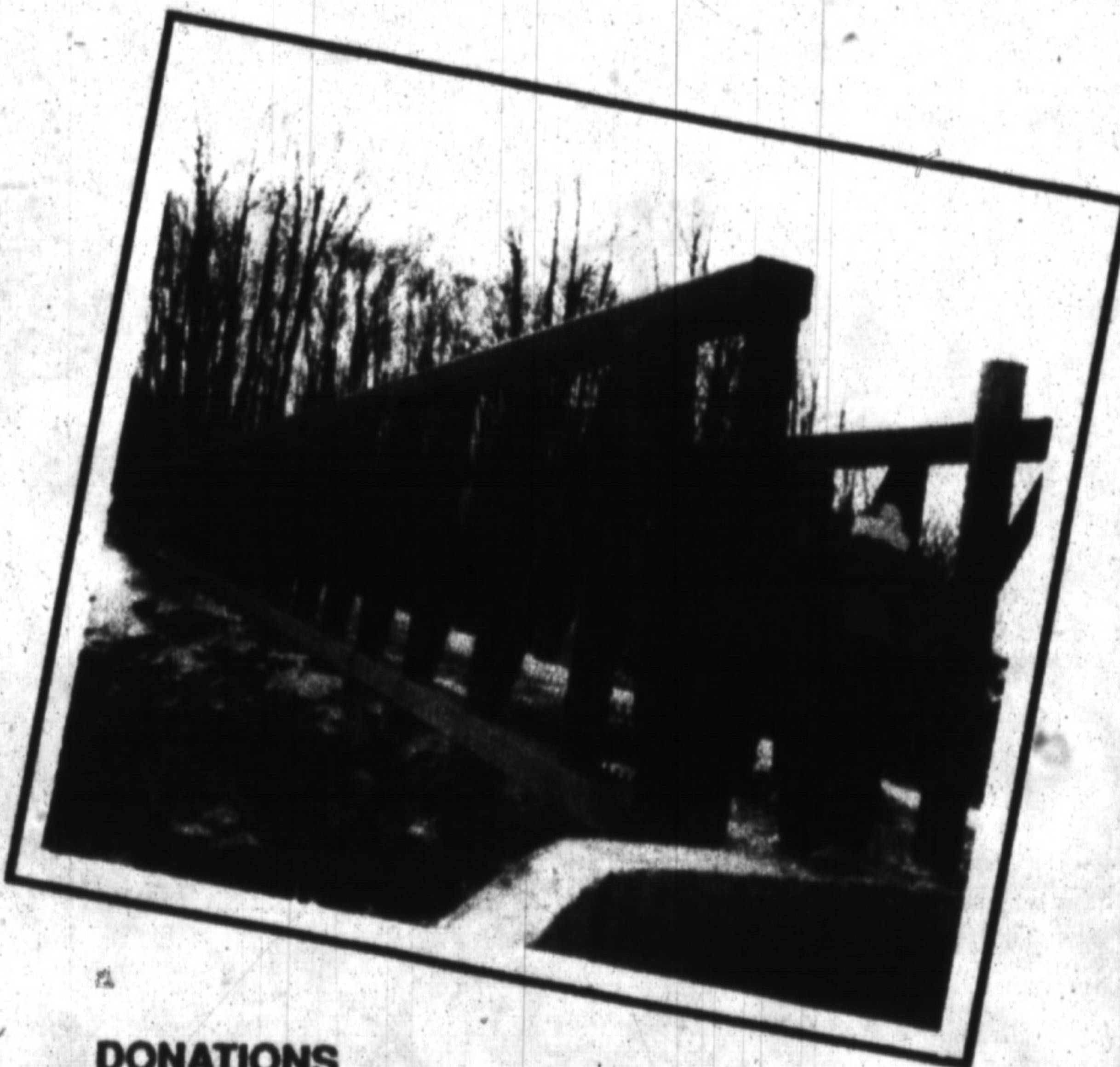
