# Woman to abandon her home

A Milton woman who lost in her bid to block the building of a church complex near Kilbride says she will abandon her home because there's no point trying to live in the shadow cast by her adversaries.

"I'm leaving," said Sharon Daniels Monday afternoon from her house on McNiven Road. "I'm walking away from my home. This has just ruined my whole life."

Recently Minister of the Environment Ruth

Grier ruled that the Serbian Orthodox Church was free to construct a bishop's residence, church and cemetery on the 42 acres of land it owns adjacent

to Ms Daniels. Initially the Niagara Escarpment Commission approved the project, but Ms Daniels, supported by 218 area residents who called themselves the McNiven Road Action Committee, successfully appealed. The church pressed the matter, however, raising the ante so that the ultimate decision was made by Ms Grier.
