## Manor staff discover limitations

Staff at Halton Centennial Manor stepped into the shoes of the elderly residents they care for when they donned special equipment which simulates the effects of aging.

Approximately 40 staff members at the local home for the aged participated in the 'Through Other Eyes Workshop', sponsored by the Educational Resources Unit of the Office for Seniors Issues. The workshop was facilitated by Larry Masson of Halton Regional Police Service. Through Other Eyes is designed to create awareness of the needs of seniors, physically or developmentally disabled persons.

Two years ago, Manor administrator Margaret Strecker, participated in the workshop as part of Seniors' Awareness Week. According to Ms Strecker, it was a powerful experience. She was convinced the workshop would have a positive impact on service delivery to the seniors who live at Halton Centennial Manor.

The participants were outfitted with various devices - arm and leg weights, modified goggles, gloves - that simulate disabilities that often affect older adults and disabled persons. Staff were then given a series of tasks to complete. During the discussion period that followed, all participants agreed that they had experienced the frustrations of obtaining services when less than fully abled.

Staff reported the following:

- a better understanding of the service needs of their residents
- a recognition of the need for change
- an identification of service and structural barriers at the Manor
- a desire to make recommendations that will lead to improvement in the Manor's services to the elderly.

## These schools are for the birds

Schools or classes in the Halton Region can adopt a bird of prey to assist the Halton Region Conservation Foundation raise funds for the expansion of the Mountsberg Wildlife Centre.

The expansion project includes an addition to the new interpretive centre and the development of a new facility to care for injured birds of prey.

The Mountsberg Centre for Birds of Prey will include a rehabilitation building to handle the 200 birds in a year that are released back into the wild as well as an interpretation area that includes feeding and flying demonstrations and displays on the natural history of the birds.

The Adopt a Bird of Prey Program for Schools was

developed specifically for the educational community as a way of supporting this conservation project. The program began in 1991 and has raised more than \$8,000.

Participants receive a certificate of appreciation and an educational presentation is conducted at the school. The presentation includes the release of the adopted bird.

Any schools adopting two birds or more will have the school's name permanently placed on a donor recognition panel on the rehabilitation centre. Program participation is limited but several opportunities are still available for 1992. 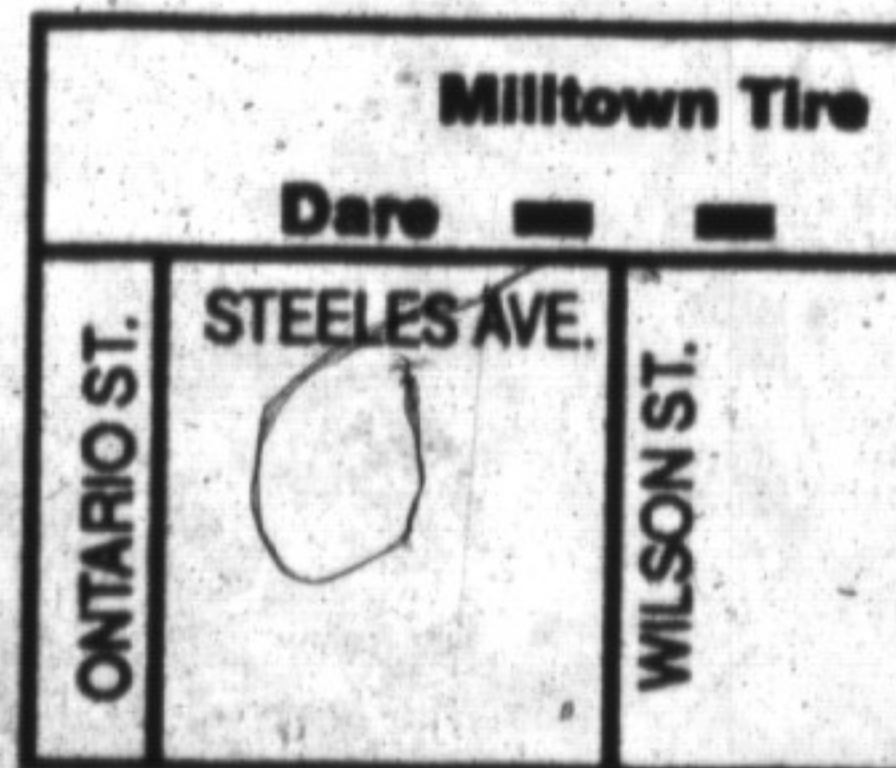

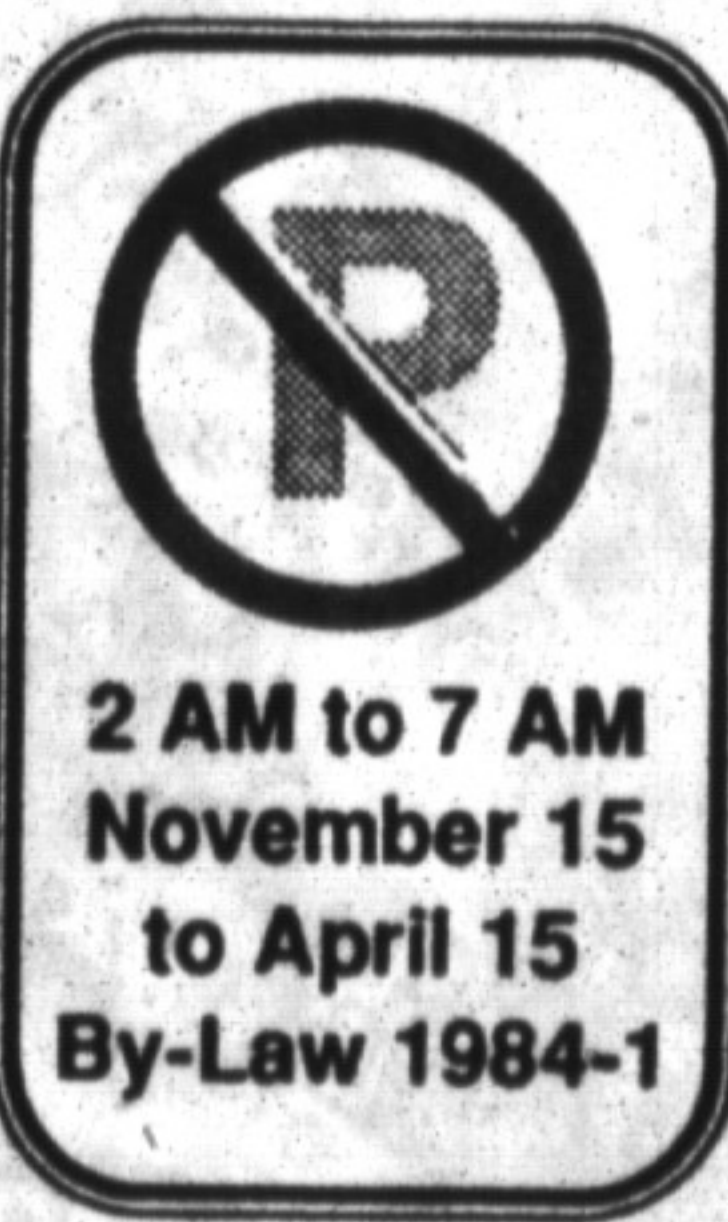
#### NOTICE TO VEHICLE OWNERS BY-LAW 1984-1
