But Brampton's top line of Wells, Marciello and Anthony Miele took control at the next faceoff and walked in to beat Chipman only 41 seconds later.

By that time both Milton and Brampton fans were frantically screaming for their respective teams to break the tie and deliver a victory. Milton answered the calls with less than four minutes left in regulation time when ex-Capital Jason Ritchie stole the puck during a scramble in front of the net and lifted one past Pellicori. Emmett and Seymour assisted on the winning goal.

Results from game four in Brampton Thursday night, which could have ended the series, were not available at press time. If necessary, game five was scheduled for Milton Memorial Arena Friday at 8 p.m., with game six slated for Brampton Monday night and a game seven slated for Milton on Tuesday at 8 p.m.
