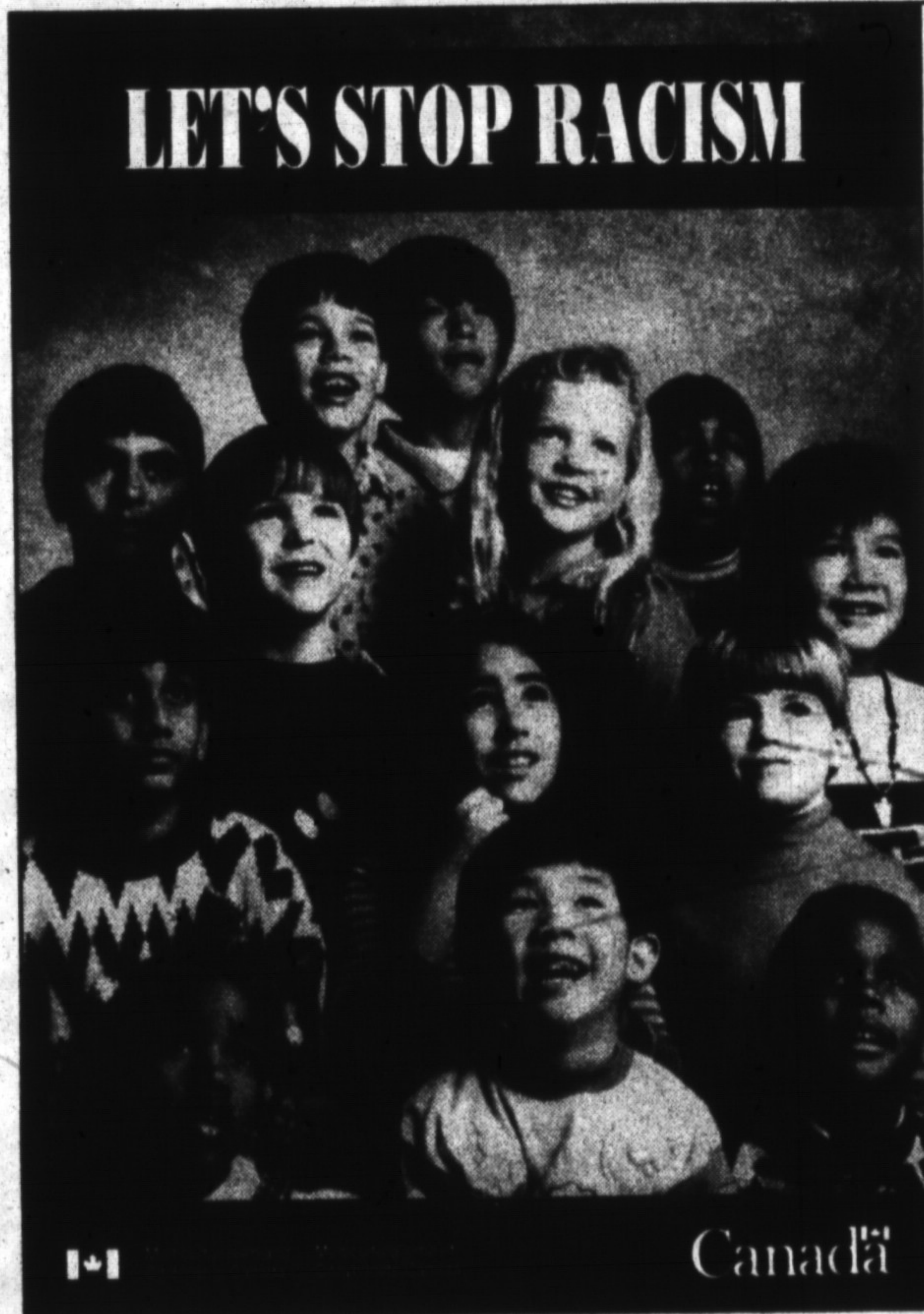

Let's bring back the hope of a better tomorrow and make it real because ...

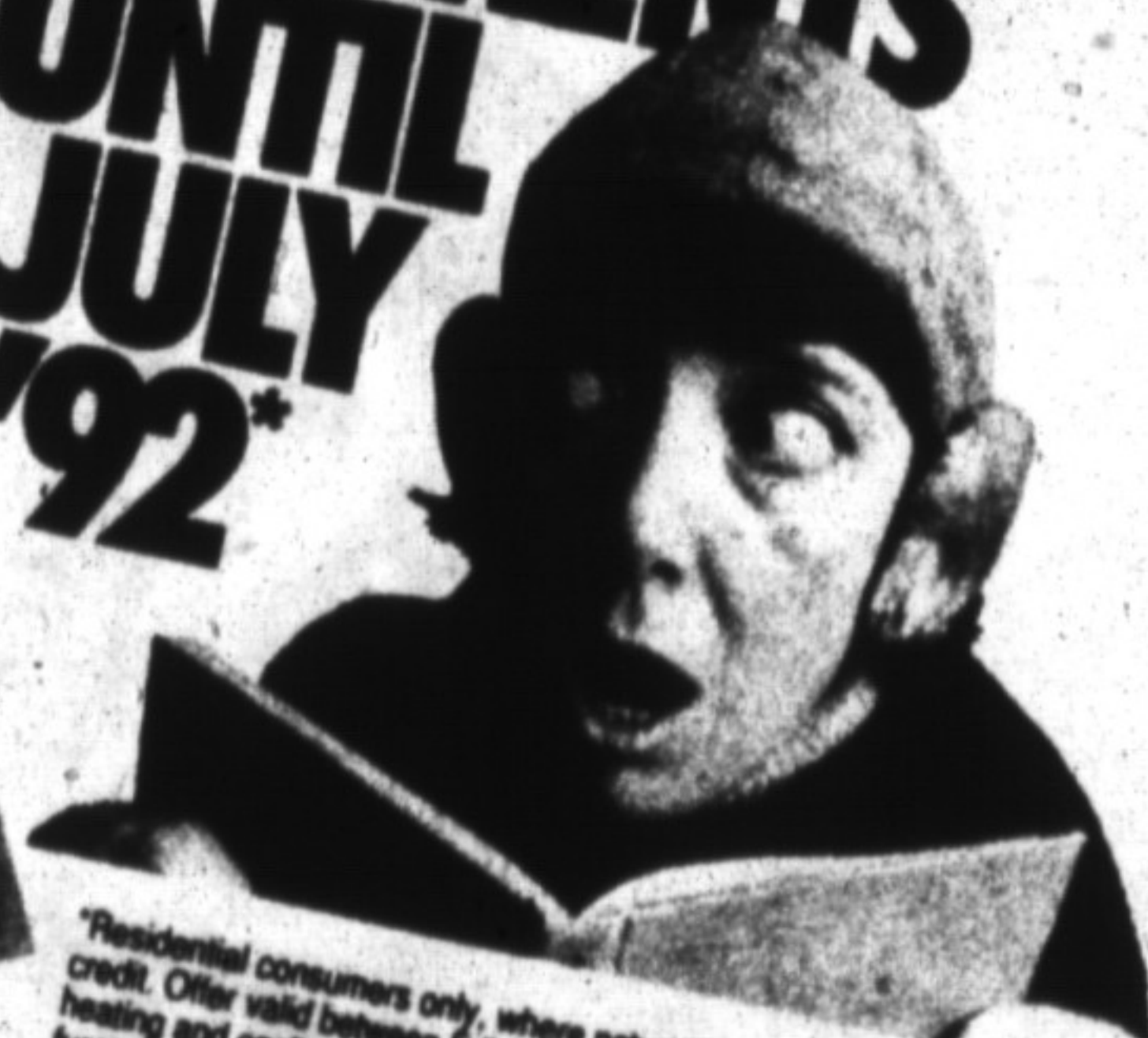
