Halton Region's Earth Week celebrations begin

Monday, as part of a 200-million people strong environmental awareness campaign around the globe. Various activities are planned for the area, culminating in a "giant happening" at Bronte Creek Provincial Park in Oakville next Sunday (April 26).

Mark Jones, the regional sales manager for Union Gas, brought a conservation message to Milton municipal council's general committee last Mon

day night as he outlined Earth Week plans. Union Gas, along with Milton Hydro, regional government and the area school boards are among the

participants in the program. "The theme is how individuals can reduce their

energy resources," Mr. Jones told councillors. The campaign will promote car things, he added.

Co-driver's sentence appealed

The sentencing of one of the two youths involved in last summer's car accident which claimed the life of a 16year-old Milton girl is being appealed, a. Halton crown attorney said Wednesday.

The case in which a Milton girl, now 18, was sentenced to probation will go before the Court of Appeal in Toronto, said Crown Attorney Laurie Jago. The second girl, now 17, who was also sentenced to probation will not be part of the appeal.

In June E.C. Drury High School student Carly MacNeil died when the car she and five other youths were riding in hit a hydro pole and overturned. Two teens were co-driving the car when the fatal crash occurred on No. 5 Sideroad, east of First Line.

Last month Judge James Fuller sentenced the elder driver, who pleaded guilty to criminal negligence causing death, to three years probation and ordered her to perform 150 hours of community service work.

He gave the 17-year-old, convicted of dangerous driving, one year probation and ordered her to perform 40 hours of community service work.

Judge Fuller also prohibited the girls from driving during their probationary periods.

Ms Jago, who asked for open custody jail terms. for the girls at the sentencing March 27, said the case will be reviewed in the Court of Appeal based on transcripts from court proceedings.
