Mohawk fund tops \$50,000

Donations exceeding \$50,000 have poured in from across Canada and the United States to aid horsemen affected by the April 2 fire at Mohawk Raceway.

The Mohawk Barn 3 Fund, set up by the Ontario Jockey Club (OJC) which owns the Campbellville race track, has received donations from both Canadian and American stables and breeders, as well as from the general public.

"Money is still coming in," said OJC spokesperson Kathy Wade Vlaar.

The OJC started off the fund by donating \$10,000, and Toronto businessman Robert Grand — who lost several horses in the devastating blaze added \$25,000 to the pot.

Another fundraiser — in the form of a dinner-dance and silent auction - will be held at Mohawk Raceway Thursday, April 30. Tickets cost \$100 and can be purchased from the Guelph Line track's publicity office.

The fire which killed 69 horses and wiped out nine trainers' stables is being called the worst disaster in North American horse racing history. Damages and losses are estimated to be in the millions.


