Sundays are in the books

All sports card collector stores are not created equal, according to the Retail Business Holidays Act.

Downtown Milton has two such stores, located across the street from each other. One can open Sundays while the other would be breaking the law by doing that. What makes Comic Express more equal than Young Guns is the percentage of comic books sold there.

Diane Roberts opened Young Guns last July with the intention of selling cards on Sundays. The first Sunday she opened, the Main Street store was visited by police and the owner was told she'd have to close.

Eric Walton, who owns Comic Express with his son Heath, says the law is explicit. Under section 113 of the Retail Holidays Business Act, stores with 50 per cent of floor space dedicated to periodicals - in this case comic books — and which have 40 per cent of sales in periodicals can open Sundays.

When Heath started the business five years ago at age 16, he wasn't planning to open Sundays. His father, Eric, who became involved in the store when hours were expanded, says the decision to open Sunday was forced on them by customers.

"They said they'd go out of town if we didn't open," he explains.

It's a "big day" for comic book collectors, says Eric.

Diane says Sundays are also popular for hobbyists who collect sports cards. Still, she can't sell cards while her competitor across the street can sell on Sundays.

"I think the law will change soon anyway. If they're going to allow gambling ...," she predicts.

Until then Young Guns will be silenced on Sundays.

What's News At The Seniors Centre

A record number of seniors took part in Spacewalk 2000, a walking program for older adults, during Canada's Fitweek last year. Between May 24 and June 2, 1991, 48,579 older Canadians walked 884,191 miles of 1.4 million kilometres. Milton seniors contributed 910 kilometres to that total. That's an increase of almost 6,000 walkers from across the country, up 14% from 1990. They covered a distance of 160,000 miles longer than during Fitweek 1990.

The theme of Spacewalk 2000 is for seniors to walk an earthly equivalent of the distance through the solar system by the year 2000 to welcome the dawn of a new century. The program encourages seniors to walk in groups, alone, or just

with the dog around the block to help achieve the project goal. In 1990, the walkers started at Pluto and finished just outside Neptune. From that point, the distance accumulated last year put them just outside Uranus. The goal this year will be to continue on to Saturn.

Spacewalk 2000 is aimed at adults 50 plus to increase their awareness and participation in active living. Since walking can seafely and easily be worked into a regular schedule, it is an excellent activity for today's seniors. Walking contributes to the social, mental and physical well-being of older adults. Since health is one of their main concerns, walking makes sense!
