Milton District Mustangs
 Last season: 3-4-1, sixth place. Coaches: Brad Reaume, John Davis. The Mustangs have no depth. Catcher Dave McDuffe, all purpose man Mike McPhail and right-handed pitcher Duane Eggleton are the rep players and all can hit the ball. Outfielder Jim Fay wields another good bat as does first baseman Ryan Peddie but when you consider what Reaume says about his pitching, this team could have problems. "We have three or four guys who are adequate," the coach says. "If we play good defence they'll look better than they really are. I think we have a reasonably sound defence."

only three players. A veteran infield and superb pitching depth behind ace right-hander Adam Hagan should make Georgetown a power. The coach can choose from among six pitchers, including Hagan and righty Scott Vandevalk, also a third baseman. All-star basketball guard Adam Poyntz, a righty can bring it in the low 80s. And how about this Greg Luzinski type DH? John Coleman, a 6'4", 260 pound defensive lineman for the Reb football team. "I like what we've got," says Marinangeli. White Oaks Wildcats
 Last season: 7-1, first place. Coaches: Kim Dutton, Robin Slack. Dutton didn't think he'd have many people back, but he does. The ace of the staff RHP Rob Backus returns as do lefties Chris Walker and Chuck Garner. Centerfielder Graig Spence will wreak havoc on the basepaths and covers a lot of ground on defence while the veteran infield of Garner at 1B, 2B. Paul Bussiere, SS Russ Jeffers and 3B Backus is solid. The only question mark is at catcher, where the rock solid Drew Spence has graduated. Walker and Andy Crowe will attempt to fill the void. Overall, the 'Cats look to be one of the best teams in the division if not the

Loyola Hawks
 Last season: 1-7, seventh in division. Coaches: Patrick Mayne, Dave McNamara, Pat Daly. Last year the Hawks went into the season devastated by graduations and the inexperience showed as Loyola threw away four games in the last inning. This year, many of their players — OF Anthony Vaccaro, SS Chris Dignan, catcher Vince Galluci, 3B Mark Fournier (the team MVP) — are back and a year better. At least that's what Mayne hopes. Indoor workouts during the winter should help as well and though Mayne isn't predicting anything, look for better than one league win from this crew.

Oakville Trafalgar Red Devils
 Last season: 1-6-1, sixth in division. Coach: Trevor Houston. Houston has abandoned rugby coaching this year to try baseball and what he has, is a lot of people who can throw it and double at other positions. He's got eight pitchers including three lefties, one guy best known for basketball (RHP Rick Grinbergs) who will likely be the ace and another (RHP Patrick Wagner) who is a top volleyball player with the West Side juvenile club.

Hitting though, is suspect.
Queen Elizabeth Park Eagles
 Last season: No team. Coach: Lou McAulay. The Eagles didn't field a team last year when they couldn't find a coach, so in steps McAulay, who has Oakville Minor Baseball experience at the Select level (house league all-stars). The team lacks pitching depth behind ace Sandy Spencer and John Silk, both righties. Third baseman Greg Nelvins and CF Andrew Craig look to be the best bats at bat though QEP won't be a homerun hitting machine. "We'll play Billy-ball," McAulay says of the Billy Martin bred game of bunting and hit and running he figures will lead to at least a .500 season.

Thomas Aquinas Raiders
 Last season: 0-7-1, eighth in division. Coach: Bob Goodwin, Lou Grbcenc. A rough first season for the young Raiders has been banked as experience, which should help them win at least a couple this time. LHP Craig Fournier is the ace and should receive more support both offensively and defensively this season from the likes of LF Myron Bien, 2Bs Brad Moore and Byron Gozzetto, SS Phil Jack and Josh Stevenson and 3B Andy Devlin. Goodwin is going two deep at every position and intends to play everybody until he can settle on a line-up. That could mean a slow start but as Goodwin says he's trying to build a program and figures this is the way to build year to year continuity. Last year, he said the goal for the second season would be a .500 campaign, with a championship to follow in year three. "Maybe I was a bit ahead of myself," he says now. Still, provided Fournier doesn't have to carry too much of the pitching and offensive load, look for a least a 3-5 mark.
