*Cinnamon Reel captures exciting Princess Series final

Although there were nine three-year-old fillies contesting the \$58,000 final of the Princess Pacing Series on Saturday, it was fair to say the trio of Tarport Sensation, Hop Irish and Cinnamon Reel carried the biggest credentials and as post time arrived the 'big three' didn't let the handlers or the crowd down.

As the wings unfolded, David Keyes shot Hop Irish out for command from the six hole and the tandem lit up fractions of 27.3 second, 57.4 and 1:25.4 with Tarport Sensation sitting

a patient second and Cinnamon Reel taking to the outside, third. With the field facing a fierce head wind in the stretch, it was Cinnamon Reel and reinsman Paul MacDonell outduelling Hop Irish by half a length in a spirited mile time of 1:55.4. Tarport Sensation was another half length back in third.

"They were definitely the two to beat," said MacDonell of his nearest competitors, "but I was very impressed with her after last week and I thought we had a big shot. With the wind she was happy to see the wire, but so was everybody,

The talented Cam Fella Miss pushed her

season earnings over \$61,000 for trainer William Elliott and owners Pat Jr. and Dan Daly of Hamilton.

Hanley wins GM National opener at Sanair Speedway

Before one of the largest crowds in recent history, Campbellville's Junior Hanley saw his dominance of the Quebec's Sanair Super Speedway extended one more race in the GM quick Service 150 on April 26.

Hanley was pushed to the limit however as the Molson Export — Quaker State Ford driver was able to overcome a race-long challenge by Chevrolet pilot Randy MacDonald to win the opening event of the GM NAtional Stock Car Series.

Bill Zardo Sr. of Brampton started on the pole but Hanley quickly overpowered him for the lead. MacDonald, who started alongside Zardo, took a few laps to compose himself for The victory was Hanley's third consecutive his run at Hanley. The American-Canadian Tour's 1985 rookie of the year blew by Hanley on the 19th lap only to give up the lead after pitting.


