Museum to open May 19

Visitors of all ages are invited to discover the evolution of agriculture and rural life in the province during the Ontario Agricultural Museum's 1992 season.

The gates to the 32-hectare site will open to the public May 19. The museum takes visitors on a journey tracing rural Ontario's modest beginnings to modern technologies.

Daily demonstrations, displays, farm animals and other active features contribute to the portrayal of the province's rural roots.

Nine annual events highlight this season's activity roster. The museum's "Seniors Days" offer 12 days of activities and demonstrations for those young at heart.

From June 1 to 12 inclusive those 65 years and over will be treated to an old-fashioned admission fee of 65 cents. The museum is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. May 19 to September 20. Admission costs \$3.50 for adults, \$1.75 for youths (6 to 17 years of age) and seniors, and \$8.50 for families. Group rates also apply.
