Food bank users will reap the harvest of 'Feedback'

Some people travel to Third World countries to help the hungry feed themselves. Sherilyn Kirkpatrick and Murray Russell have started a grassroots organization to do that job and more, at home in north Halton.

They founded Feedback Canada four months ago and with funding from Canadian Save the Children and much community support, are now awaiting the harvest.

There are 17 acres spread around Halton from Norval to Oakville, where a variety of vegetables are being grown for area food banks. The harvest is expected to be 100,000 pounds of vegetables, including cauliflower, broccoli, peas, lettuce, cabbage and beans.

Indoor growing kits with materials for creat-

ing container gardens are available through Feedback Canada, as well as instruction in windowsill and backyard gardening. Food banks have received 3,000 kits for growing pole beans, tomatoes and sprouting alfalfa.

The organization is also encouraging farmers to donate surplus crops or to intentionally "throw in some extra seeds", says Mr. Russell. Through the Feedback Canada Surplus Campaign, food bank recipients and other volunteers will harvest and distribute the crops. 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Student remembered for sense of humour

Jamie Harper will always be remembered dressed in his favourite hockey sweater and baseball cap which were known around E.C. Drury High School as his "informal uniform."

Friends of the Grade 12 student, who was killed by a train Saturday, also won't forget his ability to make people laugh, said Brenda Kearney, principal at E.C. Drury.

The 18-year-old had a "tremendous sense of humour," said Ms Kearney who recited a memorial in Jamie's honour over the school intercom yesterday, the first day back following the Victoria Day holiday weekend.

"Kids speak generally very well of him," she said in an interview.

Flags were flying at half-mast at the Ontario Street high school yesterday morning. The school also paused for a minute of silence in Jamie's memory.

Several students and teachers in need of help dealing with the tragedy were "in and out" of a room set up for counsellors from the Halton Board of Education's Tragic Events Response Team. The counsellors were also on hand in classes which Jamie would have attended.

Before first attending E.C. Drury in 1988, Jamie was a student of Robert Baldwin and W.I. Dick schools. He was an average student and most enjoyed outdoor education, said the principal.

The funeral takes place today at Grace Anglican Church at 1 p.m. followed by burial at Evergreen Cemetery.

Jamie is survived by is mother Carol, sister Wendy, and brother Glen. His father, Donald Harper, passed away several years ago.

Knife-wielding youth gets six months

A 15-year-old boy who forced a Milton woman into her car and threatened her with butcher knife was sentenced Friday to six months secure custody at a youth centre.

The 18-year-old victim, an employee of Belamy's Restaurant, was walking through the parking lot of an Ontario Street and Derry Road mall in March at 8:15 p.m. when she was approached by a youth who pushed her into the passenger seat of her car.

Declaring he wanted to steal the vehicle, the boy threatened to cut the woman's throat and attempted to bind her hands with electrical tape.

The screaming victim managed to honk the car horn and escape the vehicle. The suspect fled, but later turned himself into police.

Judge James Fuller also gave the youth, whose name is protected under the Young Offenders Act, 18 months probation.
