Beach hotline gives advice on pollution levels

The Beach Hot Line is back. Starting June 12, callers will again be able to hear Christine, the voice of the beach hotline, advising them of the latest beach testing results.

There has been a number of changes this year. The hotline itself has changed. The new number is 825-6111. The line is available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The beach sampling program has also been changed. Due to budgetary constraints, sampling will be confined to areas where people are most likely to swim.

The areas include Kelso Conservation Area here in town, Coronation Park and Bronte Park West in Oakville, Beachway Park and MacDonald Park in Burlington, and Prospect Park in Halton Hills.

Areas no longer sampled are: Spencer Smith Park, Sioux Lookout Park, Bronte Park West, Dingle Park, Smallwood Acres, and the Breezes.

A Historical Look at Milton

The thud of an axe on a solid white pine broke the forest stillness as the first settler challenged his new land. Here on crown land, bordering the Sixteen Mile Creek, was to be today's Milton.

The setting had been untouched except by nomadic Indian tribes who settled for their agricultural-type of life. The first surveyor in the early 1800s reported the area to be "a primeval forest; unbroken except for the occasional beaver meadow and a few Indian corn fields in the lower valley flats."

The Willets began settlement work on their farm just south of Derry Road on today's Ontario St. in 1816. There were others as well. The early settlers included the Harrison, Martin, Whitfield, Foster, Greenias, Huffman and Testzel families.

Although a scattering of settlers was evident in the area, they were isolated from one another and in 1820 when Thomas and Elizabeth Harrison built their log home, south of today's Main St. on Bronte St., there were no other women around for socializing for almost a year.

Jasper and Sarah Martin came to the area in 1821. They were both 21 years old and their two sons, John 3 and Joseph 4 months old. They arrived from Northumberland in May of 1818 and spent three years in York before they came to the area to claim their crown land.

Seeing the potential of water power from the Sixteen Mile Creek, Jasper Martin built a grist mill and was in operation by 1822. In 1825 he added a sawmill and ashery. George Brown opened the first post office in 1836 and the seeds of commercial development were planted.
