first time in 1991. There were 4,237,747 in the GTA fold by mid-1991, up from 3,735,031 in 1986.

In terms of trends, Oakville is expected to surpass Burlington's population in the not-too-distant future. Oakville's planning calls for a ceiling of 200,000 residents. Burlington is not expected to become that large. Halton Hills will be the third largest centre in Halton for some time to come, topping 40,000 residents, while it is anticipated that Milton will gain approximately 8,000 people by the turn of the century as at least some steps are taken to resolve the utility servicing issue.

Over the longer term, Milton is expected to become substantially larger and overtake Halton Hills as The GTA, the country's largest the third-biggest centre in the region, once major utility improvements are made. The focus of the Halton Urban Structure Review, a \$4 million regional study, is planning for vigorous growth in Milton and north Oakville over the next 20 years, with the possibility of a \$100 million socalled "big pipe" to bring water north from Lake Ontario.


