

# Plenty of things for all to do at Nassagaweya fair Saturday

Nassagaweya celebrates Canada 125 tomorrow with two events — the Nassagaweya Community Fair, followed by the Brookville Minor Ball Barbecue and Dance.

Games, crafts, prizes, musical presentations and an abundance of food will highlight the day. There is no admission charge and activities are reasonably priced.

"We want families and friends to feel they have received their money's worth," said fair chairman Kathy Harding. Proceeds will benefit Nassagaweya and Brookville School.

Starting off the day, the Fun Run at 9:15 a.m. will be marked out in 1 km and 5 km courses designed for both walkers and serious runners of all age and experience levels.

The Nassagaweya Community Fair opens at 10 a.m. and runs until 3 p.m. on the grounds of Brookville School, rain or shine.

Visitors to the fair are invited to sign a Canadian flag which will be raised in a special ceremony at 2 p.m. Canada lapel pins and 600 cupcakes baked by volunteers and decorated with flags donated by the Paper Factory in Milton will be handed out for the giant birthday celebration.

An RCMP officer, Halton Dairy Princess Lisa Murray of Nassagaweya and a Brookville student chosen by ballot will participate in the ceremony.

Activities will include Kid's Alley, with favourite

children's games such as balloon darts, face painting, and a fishing pond. Teen Alley features sport-type games, including a basketball and football toss and the all-time favourite, dunk-the-teacher.

A tot lot will be offered with a free play area for pre-schoolers. The petting zoo will display exotic animals, including Iggy the Iguana, miniature horses, pigmy goats, a tiger cub, as well as traditional farm animals. Pony rides will also be available.

For those with creative flair, low-cost craft tables will feature plastic jewelry and a chance to decorate T-shirts. The Milton Fire Department and community groups will also have displays and exhibits.

Entertainment will be provided by a steel band at 11 a.m. and the Purple Turtles, a teen group from Burlington, at 12:30 and 1:30 p.m.

A giant prize raffle will offer a chance for participants to win gifts donated by area merchants. The first 125 people who purchase \$10 books of tickets will receive product samples and promotional items from IGA, valued at more than \$10.

Immediately following the fair, activities continue at the Brookville ball diamond, along with a chicken barbecue organized by the Brookville Ball Association.

### DESTROY WEEDS

Notice is hereby given to all persons in possession of land in accordance with the Weed Control Act, Ontario 1988, Chapter 51, Sec. 3 and 16, that unless noxious weeds growing on their lands within the Municipality of Burlington are destroyed by the date of Monday, June 8, 1992 and throughout the season, the Corporation of the City of Burlington may enter upon the said lands and have the weeds destroyed, charging the costs against the land in taxes as set out in the Act.

Hay Fever is principally caused by Ragweed, therefore Ragweed requires special continuous attention. Other noxious weeds requiring eradication are Thistles, Poison Ivy, Wild Carrot.

PLEASE NOTE: Dandelions, Burdock and Golden Rod are not considered noxious weeds under the Weed Control Act.

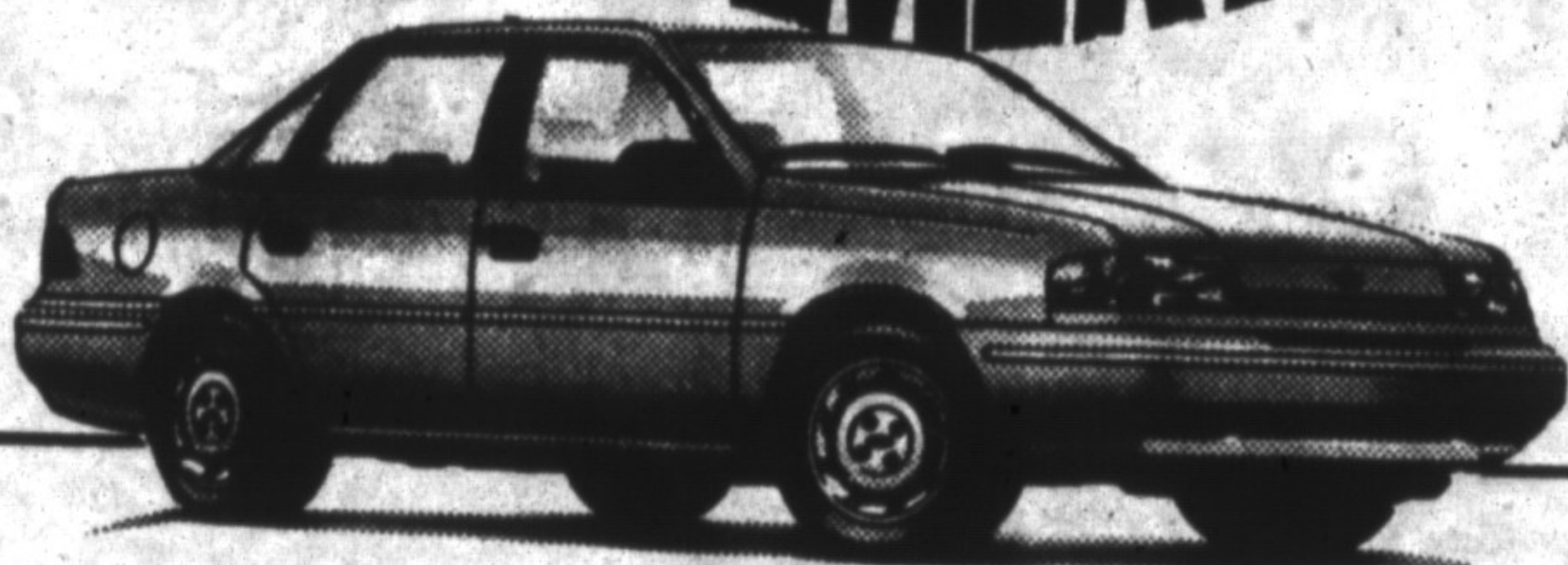
