People aged 17 to 59 years are eligible to sign up to be donors, said Nicola Jackson of the west-central Ontario branch of the Red Cross. A small blood sample will be taken from those who choose to register.

In the program, records of the potential donor's marrow type and

About 600 people across the country per year — those with blood- related diseases such as leukemia, aplastic anemia, and lymphoma — require transplants.

Donating bone marrow means surgery and often results in temporary discomfort such as soreness, stiffness, and bruising to the hip area where the marrow is taken, said Ms Jackson.

The donor may also be prescribed iron supplements following the procedure.

Bone marrow transplants were first successfully performed in the late 1960s, added Ms Jackson.
