Trading city life for tranquility

If Allycia Uccello was to paint a picture of her future, the setting would be her family's rural property and the subject would be an art academy.

Until she reaches this goal, the Campbellville artist has painted a smaller picture, beginning with her own studio and a summer art school for children.

Ms Uccello, along with her husband and two children, traded city life in Toronto for a house set in an apple orchard four years ago. Although she continues to work with students in Toronto area schools, the multi-media artist would prefer to stay closer to home.

"I see this as a unique situation," she explains.

Her studio, which once provided a cool storage area for apples, will serve as a classroom for up to 15 students aged 6 to 13 years. The surrounding property has pond a complete with swans and wooded areas, where the students will hike and collect raw materials for some of their projects.

While watercolour painting and drawing will be taught during the one-week summer sessions, they will play a secondary role to some "specialized" creations.

Projects which have been "time tested" on children for the past 23 years are the focus. The suckers cut from the apple trees will be made into walking sticks with creatures at top. Woodland animals fashioned from wood and bark, as well as treasure boxes from which creatures pop when opened, will result from the sessions.

The fine arts program is open to children who "really like art".

"They just have to be interested and focussed," she says.

There are four summer sessions, three in July and one in August, and each costs \$155. Classes run from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Ms Uccello hopes to introduce basic drawing and painting classes for adults in the fall.

A professional artist, she is currently working on two commissioned sculptures and another piece for a hotel in Ottawa.
