am compelled to write to you regarding the May 22 story about the mother who refused to vaccinate her children. At first I couldn't bring myself to write this letter, but it is important to me to share with people the importance of vaccines.

I was angered by her refusal to vaccinate her children. My son died of meningitis because he was not old enough to be vaccinated. He died of haemophilus influenza. The vaccine could only be administered to 18 month old children, he was 17 months olds when he died.

Only because of research has this vaccine become available to younger children. Since his death, I have made a point of asking my friends if they have had their children vaccinated for this. I know one person who went out of her way to have her child vaccinated against meningitis when we heard about new cases in another town.

Think just how precious your child's life is. You carry a child for nine months and safely deliver a healthy baby. After the baby is born, there is the constant fear of maybe losing that child to sudden infant death syndrome. You try to rid your home of all dangers, with safety plugs, stair guards, etc. You strap the child in a car seat.

To me, vaccinating my children eliminated all the other risks. We have virtually eliminated diseases like diptheria, polio, and whooping cough to name a few. This did not happen because people refused the vaccines that researchers spent years to make. What about penicilin and tetracycline? Where would we be without them. Sure, you can say but she is just against the measles vaccine", I think if you look further this is not true.

As for Ms Taylor's letter to the editor published on June 3, I can only say what difference does it make to the story that Mrs. Turner is a chiropractor who should be referred to as doctor.

The story was about a mother who refused to vaccinate her children, her being a doctor hardly influences the story in any way. She wrote "thank God we have health care professionals who are cognizant of these risks and take a stand, thereby alerting those parents who are not aware".
