## Speed sign action was too slow

The following letter was addressed to Mayor Gord Krantz and Milton town council. A copy was sent to this newspaper for publication.

It appears that Halton Region and the Halton Regional Police are unable to solve the problem of dangerous driving in the rural areas of Milton. Once again a fatal accident has occurred on the Guelph Line.

Despite many motions by Milton council over the years to increase radar surveillance, nothing meaningful has developed.

Almost a year ago council approved a report and passed a motion requesting that regional council change the speed signs on Guelph Line and ask the police to increase radar surveillance to mitigate the problem. Nothing has happened.

Lack of proper signs means the police can't enforce speed control on 25 Sideroad. And since the resurfacing of the northern part of Guelph Line, the average speed is between 20 and 40 kilometres above the limit.

I am told the only available police radar device is out of service. This is preposterous given the \$30 million plus police budget. Possibly Chief James Harding's ivory tower in the new luxurious multi-million dollar police headquarters is too top heavy with paper pushers, while not enough personnel are on the road.

The money generated from more ticketing would go a long way to paying the freight, along with a contribution toward the long overdue retirement party for Chief Harding.

I hope council will consider pressing the Region for control over the speeding problems in rural Milton.

seems to have been Rae-incarnated on the issue, once a Town dies it's gone forever.
