Deaf teacher sings to promote pride

A local deaf singer is using her talents to spread a message that being deaf is something to be proud

Patti Trofimenkoff, a Grade 12 English and drama teacher at the E.C. Drury School for the Deaf, doesn't let her hearing impairment stop her from doing her favourite things - singing, dancing and sign-

And at the same time, Mrs. Trofimenkoff, who says she wants to go "way up to the top" with her talents, sets out to increase deaf people's self esteem and pride in their culture.

She performs often across the province with her deaf partner Juan Jaramillo of Toronto, receiving rave reviews. Mrs. Trofimenkoff and Juan, a former student of Milton's Ontario Street school for the deaf, were awarded certificates recognizing their talents from York Region during National Access Awareness

Week earlier this month.

Helen Sherman, whose brother is deaf, witnessed the duet perform at a mall during the special week. They took everyone's breath away," she recalls. "The audience was just in awe."

Their performances also help change myths believed by society that deaf people are incapable of such feats, says Ms Sherman.

The singing team will perform at Hamilton's Mohawk College June 27 and 28, as well as at Reena Fun Day at the Promenade Shopping Centre in Thornhill August 31.

They have also been invited to strut their stuff at Ontario Place July 1 for Canada's 125th birthday celebration. But, Ms Trofimenkoff said, she may have to decline the request to instead spend the holiday with her husband and two children who live in Saskatchewan.

Born in Texas, Ms Trofimenkoff met her husband at a college for the deaf in Washington. They were married and moved to her husband's home province.

She worked at a deaf school in the prairie province until it closed, and later began working at the E.C. Drury School for the Deaf.

Since she moved to Milton nine months ago, Ms Trofimenkoff has organized two dance groups at the school made up of eight and 12 dancers. The students learn to dance to music through vibrations the sound sends.

She also directed school play Terminal, performed by deaf students at the Sears Festival this year. The production won several awards.

Ms Trofimenkoff likes to perform to music by Whitney Houston because she says it's inspirational.

Music is in her blood, she says. She began taking singing and dance lessons at the age of 8.
