

Golf etiquette

If you are new to the game of golf, this segment is intended to equip you with the same information seasonal golfers already share, and should make you feel perfectly at home on a golf course.

First-off, until you master the grip and stance, your game is one long checklist of pre-swing thoughts. Seemingly, the entire golf course waits while you paralyze yourself with instruction.

As a friend once pointed out, the urge is 'to hit the detonator' to get you to swing. The best policy is to confine your early golf to a driving range or the many executive style courses which are intended for both beginners and to tune-up games.

A general rule of thumb in terms of speed of play expectations on the part of the golf course and fellow golfers is that you should average 10 minutes per hole at an executive length course and 15 minutes per hole on a full length course.

General Do's and Don'ts

- Leave your bag on the side of the green you will be exiting from.
- The farthest from the hole plays first. You begin putting when everyone is on the green. However, where your shot will not distract your playing partners, play when ready.
- Mark your ball on the green until it is your turn to putt.
- Determine what shot you are going to play before it is your turn.
- Never stand in someone's putting line or distract them in any way while they are playing a shot.
- If you tend to take extra time when making a shot, try and compensate by moving quickly between shots.
- Count your score while off the green.
- Always replace your divots, rake bunkers and repair your ball and spike marks.
- Always let faster groups play through (or if you are going to look for a ball). It only takes a few minutes and no one ever winds up waiting.

If you follow these traditional, common sense guidelines the only remaining source of frustration is any pressure you apply to yourself.
