## Reform Party will stand by promises says potential local candidate

Voters want a guarantee that the Reform Party won't fall back on its promises if elected, local candidates vying to represent the party heard Thursday night.

"What guarantee do we have that you won't change between now and Ottawa?" asked more than one person in the crowd that attended the party's second all-candidates meeting in the Oakville-Milton riding Thursday night.

"Everything is in writing," responded Dr. Allan Somersall of Oakville, one of four candidates who appeared before an audience of about 50 people at the Milton Lions' Club Hall atop Memorial Arena. "That's what you're going to get."

The St. Kitts native was referring to the novice party's platform which is outlined in black and white. "I don't know of any other party that has done this," said the outspoken physician.

Dr. Somersall, 43, and four other political hopefuls — Rick Malboeuf and Bill Graham, both of Milton, and Bob Acheson and Pat Hurley, of Oakville — are running to represent the party in the local riding.

Their reasons for entering the race are similar. "We are all both pissed-off and concerned" about Canada's

present state and what the country holds for the future, said Mr. Hurley, 56, a broadcast executive for MacLean Hunter, who vowed to follow Reform Party leader Preston Manning's declaration to "bring common sense back to Ottawa."

A financial executive, Mr. Acheson, 52, became concerned about Canada's future while working in Europe. The Lindsay, Ont. native said he had trouble "enticing Europeans to invest in Canada."

The candidates, who were each allotted 10 minutes to address the crowd, focused on issues related to a united Canada and reducing the deficit.

"Doing more and wasting less" was Dr. Somersall's theory. "We can't spend more money than we have coming in," he said.

He also said he believes in keeping Canada united under the right terms, but not "at any cost."

Mr. Malboeuf, 41, called for a crackdown on illegal immigrants, and criticized Canada's current "open-door policy."

"Only true refugees" who have been forced to flee their countries in desperate situations should be exempt from the proper immigration channels, said the independent businessman in the automotive tool and equipment sales and marketing field.
