

## Week starts with four dingers

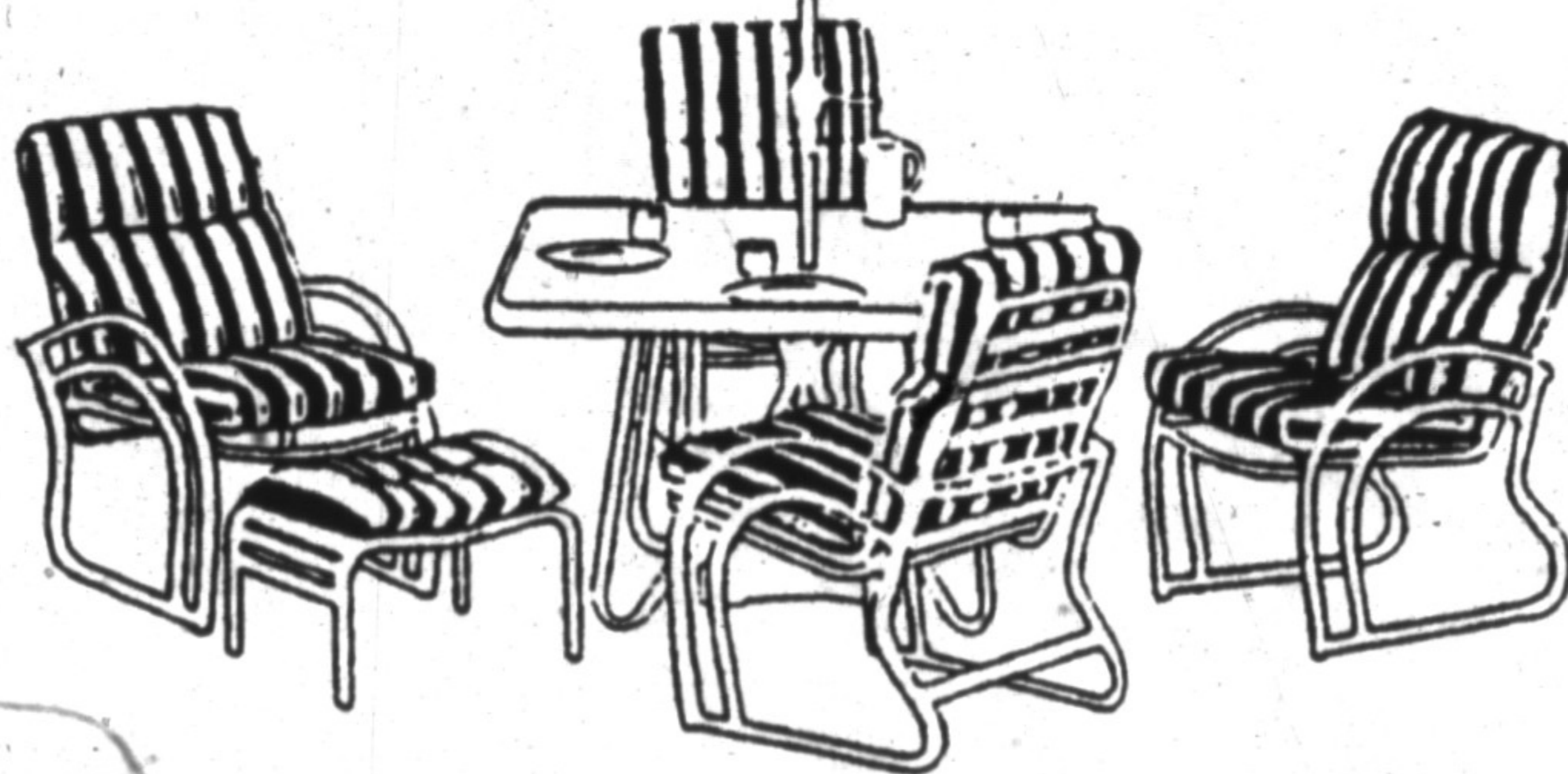
