Hans brings home five medals in track

Four local athletes, members of Oakville's Athletics International track and field club took part in the recent District B Track and Field Championships at T.A. Blakelock High School in Oakville.

Robbie Hans, 14, who attends Milton District High School, took three first place finishes along with a second and third. He was first in the boys 15 and under triple jump with a personal best of 12.48 metres. It was also a MDHS record. He copped firsts in the long jump, at 5.52 metres and in the high jump at 165 centimetres.

Hans managed a second place in the discus throwing 33.70 metres and a third in javelin with a toss of 34.46 metres. Both marks were personal bests.

Ryan Finn also had a big day with two seconds, two fourths and a fifth. He was second to Hans in the triple jump at 10.75 metres, and the long jump at 4.80 metres. He was fourth

in the high jump at 160 centimetres and fourth in javelin at 26.80 metres. His 19.82 metre toss of the discus was good enough for fifth.

Steve Turner, 12, also competed in the same category. He turned in a fourth in the triple jump at 10.16 metres, a fourth in the discus at 20.98 metres, both personal bests and a sixth in the high jump at 150 centimetres.

Amy Newell, competing in the girls under 17 division, finished third with a 13.4 second 80 metre hurdles, and fifth with a 9.83 metre triple jump.

Athletics International won the club portion of the competition handily, counting as many points in the morning of the all-day event, as was necessary to win. According to club director Bruce Burton, the club is one of the few in the area to coach throwing events, and so has a discernable strength in that group of events, which it dominates.

Under 16s win gold

The Milton girls under 16 selects captured the Woolwich Invitational under 17 soccer tournament, their first event of eight scheduled this season.

Between the alert, top notch, stingy goal-keeping of Linda Lipari and the rock solid defence of Michelle Damp, Lisa Frizzo, Viviana Gerace, Jody Gregory, Angela Mastracci and Karen Murray, not a goal was scored against Milton in the tournament.

Likewise, the aggressive midfielders, Shona Cameron, Kelly Douglas, Zsuzsa Fedacsek, Michelle Maynard and Heather Woods were equally protective of their shutouts while feeding the forwards with many sterling passes and play set-ups.

Forwards Marisa Capobianco, Maria Fredriksson, Cathrine Kemp, Karen Murray and Shannon Prevost needed no special invitation to pump their deadly accurate shots into the opposition's goal.

In their first game, Milton showed no respect to their Elmira hosts with a 3-0 win. Kemp scored first, off a beautiful pass from Capobianco. This was followed by Fedacsek pounding her own rebound into the top corner from a dandy set-up by Fredriksson who then scored the third goal on a body block.

In their second game Milton defeated Woodstock 4-0. Kemp did most of the damage, scoring three goals. The first was assisted by Murray and Douglas, the second was a solo effort and the third the result of a perfect pass up the middle by Fedacsek. The fourth Milton goal came off a quick release from Fredriksson on the wing.

Milton's offence kicked up in their third game as they scored a 6-0 win over Kincardine. Maynard blasted the first one in off a Kincardine defender, Kemp capitalized off a nice header pass from Capobianco to Prevost for the set up. Kemp scored again off a corner kick from Maynard to Heather Woods and Prevost finished off a pair of Capobianco passes for goals. The final marker came off the foot of Douglas who drove a bullet into the back of the net.

The final game of the tournament was a cold, windswept affair. Milton came through with a 2-0 victory over Elmira on two beautiful goals from Maynard and Capobianco. Elmira's team hardly penetrated the Milton side of the field, leaving goaltender Lipari very cold.

The team's next outing is this weekend at the second annual Milton Girls Select Tournament.
