As a requirement under Ontario's Environmental Assessment Act, the Regional Municipality of Halton hereby notifies all interested individuals and parties that the Environmental Study Report (ESR) for the above mentioned project has been completed. Subject to the comments received as a result of this Notice and the receipt of other approvals as necessary, the Regional Municipality of Halton intends to proceed with the construction of the above mentioned project.

The purpose of the reconstruction is to improve safety through modifications to the horizontal and vertical alignments. The Region proposes to reconstruct Guelph Line and Derry Road, primarily on the present alignment, with property acquisition to accommodate the improved roadway cross section and horizontal and vertical alignment. The construction is tentatively scheduled to be carried out in 1993. The total construction cost estimate is \$1.5 million.

The ESR will be available for review and public comment at the following locations and times:

Interested individuals and parties have 30 calendar days from the date of this Notice to comment on the proposal. Comments must be made in writing and must be received by the Municipal Office by 4:30 p.m. on August 14, 1992.

If concerns regarding this project cannot be resolved in discussions with the Region, a person/party may request that the Minister of the Environment "bump-up" this project to an individual environmental assessment. "Bump-up" requests must be submitted to the address. below. If there are no concerns expressed by the above date, the reconstruction of Guelph Line and Derry Road in the Town of Milton/City of Burlington will proceed as presented in the ESR.

Jack and Nancy Raithby like to pamper their guests. When visitors. to their bed and breakfast (B&B) arrive in the late afternoon, they are served a glass of wine, some of Nancy's homemade cheese pate and a lesson on local attractions.

Having found their piece of paradise, it wasn't until friends insisted it would be an ideal bed and breakfast that the couple entertained the notion. Some research and a one-day seminar presented by a successful operator set the stage for Winklewood Lane Bed & Breakfast.

people in the area on business, to overflow house guests referred by local residents, to triathlon participants. The hosts cater to the different needs of guests, discussing what time they'd prefer breakfast to be served and recommending area restaurants and other attractions.

Nancy prepares homemade muffins and more exotic breakfast dishes including crepes and eggs benedict. Coffee is served in the guest wing of the home, which is complete with a table, chairs, sofa and a stone fireplace Jack lights before guest wake up during the cold months.

For breakfast, guests are treated to fine china and silver at the large dining room table in the central part of the home.

Two of the home's seven bedrooms are for guests. A third. small room can be booked if guests insist on a double bed, however. Both bedrooms have private baths and one has the fireplace suite as well as a large wooden deck overlooking the creek.

Another bed and breakfast accommodation owner who spoke at a workshop Nancy attended said his policy was to have guests leave the house by 10 a.m. and not return until 5 p.m. The Raithbys shunned that
